**TURKISH
MURDERS
CONTINUE**

**The Sick and Helpless
put Ruthlessly
to the Sword**

**Smoky Ruins, Unburied
Corpses and the Silence
of Death Mark Their
Bloody Path**

London, Sept. 21.—A report from high diplomatic sources says the powers are by no means unanimous regarding the action to be taken in the Macedonian affair. The Kaiser has partially gained Austria's sanction to his policy, which is to allow the Sultan to continue his plan of extermination. Russia is wavering.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 21.—Fresh massacres are reported in the districts of Monastir, Adrianople and Kostovo. Many towns have been destroyed by Turkish artillery. On Wednesday last the artillery killed 100 at Zeodorichean, 150 at Bodicha and at Okreni 1200 were shot, or put to death. A large number of the victims were women and children and the sick and aged, who were unable to seek safety.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 21.—A serious engagement is reported between Turkish troops and insurgents in the Perim mountains, near Melnik. The Turks lost 500 killed, including two prominent colonels.

**Naval Officers
Get a Roast**

Washington, Sept. 21.—The mail reports to the navy department this morning contain what is probably the most severe castigation ever administered to members of a court-martial. It was in the case of Assistant Paymaster Fitchworth Nicholson, who is a native of California. He entered the service two years ago, and was tried and convicted on a charge of drunkenness and scandalous conduct, tending to the destruction of good morals. It was alleged that while on shore in Chee Foo, China, Nicholson, while intoxicated, assaulted an elderly civilian. The sentence of the court was that Nicholson be reduced five numbers in his grade. Rear-Admiral Evans, in reviewing the case, says the evidence was of such a character that the sentence should have been nothing less than dismissal from the navy. Three of the officers of the court recommended clemency. Evans says these officers, Lieutenant Williams and Paymasters Biscoe and Donahoe, have proved to the convening authority, and to the fleet, their unworthiness to act hereafter as members of any court, and won't again be placed in a position of passing judgment upon other persons, or guarding and maintaining the dignity of the naval service. In addition to the three above named members of the court, who are thus unprecedentedly rebuked, are Captain Schree and Commanders Marshall, Dodd, Kinkley and Lieut. Tompkins, who was judge advocate.

**Were After
Big Money**

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Robbers last night attacked, beat into unconsciousness with a lead pipe, and gagged the express car loader, Wm. Aughran, employed on the Michigan Central. They then searched the American Express car, which leaves here on the 3:30 morning train. Two safes were rifled, but only a small amount was taken, according to the officials. The regular shipment of \$25,000, made Monday's, is not brought down until the train starts, and the robbers were evidently after this.

**Hard Times
in Russia**

St. Petersburg, Sept. 21.—Great suffering is reported in the drought provinces. At Ostrog a fire left 500 families homeless. The villages of Sergeths and Koketsharogol were nearly destroyed by fire, and 400 houses were destroyed. In the former eight persons were killed, and 80 houses and immense stores of grain burned. In the Trans Caspian states locusts have entirely destroyed the cotton crop, amounting to nearly 100,000 bales, as well as the immense growing crops of wheat and rye, and nearly all the fruit trees.

**Cabinet
is Filled**

London, Sept. 21.—The St. James Gazette today announces that Edward

has approved the appointment of the following men to cabinet positions, made vacant by resignations: Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer; Lord Selborne, colonial secretary; Arnold Foster, secretary of war; St. John Broderick, secretary for India. The Gazette adds it has good reason to believe Lord Stanley will be made postmaster-general, to succeed Austen Chamberlain.

**Talks Through
His Fedora**

Glasgow, Scotland, Sept. 21.—Designer Fife arrived home today. He advanced the idea that British ship-builders must collectively create the next challenger. He says the Americans copied the design in Shamrock II, and improved on it, and thus produced the Reliance.

**Miller Case
to Come up**

Washington, Sept. 21.—A quarterly meeting of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor began here this morning. An attempt will be made by the Central Labor Union, of this city, to bring the Miller case before the body.

**Hanna Will
not Resign**

Cleveland, Sept. 21.—Hanna denies that he intends to withdraw from the chairmanship of the Republican national committee on account of ill-health.

**Colorado State Troops
are Making Serious
Trouble**

**Will Bring Prisoners Into
Court, But Under Escort
and will Not Surrender

Cripple Creek, Colo., Sept. 21.—Habeas corpus proceedings were resumed in the district court this morning. The judge gave the military authorities until 2 o'clock this afternoon to bring the four petitioners from the bull pen into court. Chase announced he would bring the prisoners, but under a heavy detachment of soldiers, who would be instructed to resist any attempt on their arrival of officers to take charge of the men.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 21.—All the lodges of the Amalgamated Association of Steel, Iron and Tin Workers the secretary notified today to hold a special meeting. An important meet-

ing is scheduled to take place at national headquarters this week. It is currently believed a general strike will be ordered against all companies which refused to sign the wage scale. Among these is the United States steel corporation.

**Kaiser Wants
Them Killed**

Berlin, Sept. 21.—The German metal manufacturers today decided to crush the strike of the 3000 workers, which has been in progress for several days, by locking out the remaining 7000 employees, until all the others are ready to resume work. One hundred and seventy factories are idle.
