Can't get Together

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 28.—The iron workers' convention this morning is excited over a circular received from the housemiths, of New York, because they were not allowed a seat in the convention. It was addressed to Buchanan, and reads: "In refusing us a charter you endorse all that's rotten and bad in trades unionism. You lose the greatest city in the country, and there will be nothing left of your union in New York before three months pass. Any organization relying on brute strength will end in disruption." Continuing, the circular attacks those who, it says, called the strikes, because money was not coming in fast enough. Parks arose and said the housemiths are a bunch of scabs, formed into a fake union by their employers. The convention elects officers tomorrow. Trench, of San Francisco seems to have the lead.

Tinhorns Have a Panic

New York, Sept. 28.—The market ordered on a panic this morning, and there are now low records to steel stocks and local traction. Rallies followed the slump.

Shortly before 1 o'clock steel preferred sold at 59 1/2. This recalls the fact that the steel trust sold preferred stock to its employes for \$82 a share.

Washington, Sept. 28.—Congressman Bertholdt, of Missouri, who has just returned from the Vienna meeting of the parliamentary union for international arbitration, today says that flattering references were made to the United States for the Alabama affair, and they praised President Roosevelt for his recognition of The Hague in the Plus fund dispute. The international union, which is composed exclusively of members of the national legislative bodies, meets at St. Louis next year.
