She Has Passed Twenty-Six

Berlin, Sept. 29.—The Duchess of Cumberland today celebrated her fiftieth birthday at Gmunden, where she has passed her summers for many years. The Duchess is a daughter of King Christian of Denmark and a sister of the Dowager Empress of Russia and of Queen Alexandra of England.

CIGAR MEN ARE INDICTED.

Accused of Selling Brands Under Counterfeit Labels.
Lancaster, Pa.—S. R. Ross, manufacturer of cigars in Lancaster, and his factory manager, H. S. Ryder, have been indicted by the grand jury (two indictments being found against each) for manufacturing and selling cigars under counterfeit labels and trade marks all of the brands being celebrated and used by owners of imported Havana goods.

One of the brands was "Manuel Garcia" and one was "La Caroline," both of which are the property of the Havana Commercial Company. Another was "Henry Clay," belonging to the Henry Clay and Bock & Company, Ltd.

The Militia of the United States.
The present strength of the organized militia is about 109,000 enlisted men and 9000 officers. The local organizations have grown up to supply local needs, and in default of a national militia organization it has been the policy of Secretary Root to do what was practicable to nationalize these. Although congress has for nearly a century recognized the national guard in the several states by contributing \$200,000 a year toward arming and equipping it, its relations to the federal government have never been defined until recently. The confusion and bad blood liable to result from this uncertain status have manifested themselves most disagreeably in sundry cases, as in the controversy over the action taken by the 7th regiment of New York at the outbreak of the war with Spain. A story of one of our Indian wars describes Andrew Jackson as threatening to hang a whole regiment of militia for refusing to go outside of their state. They went; but the unwilling soldier does not make the best fighter, and the Jacksons are few.—World's Work.
