SUVER MAN WOUNDED

He was Struck Over
the Head by a
Club

Taken to the Salem Hospital
for Treatment of
a Fractured
Skull

Last evening about dark, Mr. Albert Ruef, of Suver, was brought to the Salem Hospital, where a severe wound in the head, caused by a blow with a piece of wood, administered by Emmett Garr, who lives in the same neighborhood.

It seems that Ruef had had a disagreement with George Garr, the outgrowth of a difference of long standing, and this came to a climax at Independence yesterday, when Ruef was struck with a club by Emmett Garr, a brother of the latter. Not fully realizing how serious the matter might be, Mr. Ruef's wife was sent for, and Mr. Garr offered to give himself up to the authorities. Upon the arrival of Mrs. Ruef she accompanied her stricken husband to Salem, where he was placed in the hospital. Upon examination it was found that his skull was fractured, and the best medical attendance was summoned, and the patient was made as comfortable as possible.

Patient Doing Well.

Mr. Ruef spent a comfortable night, having slept well, and he is in a normal condition. His temperature and pulse are good, and Dr. Byrd is very hopeful for the early recovery of the patient. He is conscious this morning, and, as he has a strong constitution, and is in the best of health, there is little danger of his case taking a turn for the worse.

How Trouble Occurred.

It is learned that Mr. Ruef had his difficulty with the Garrs at the Baldwin place, a mile south of Independence. Strong language was used on both sides, and his brother, George Ruef, warned and advised him not to come onto the place, as the feeling was so intense that trouble might ensue. It is claimed he disregarded the advice, and entered, with the results as stated above.

PIONEER MISSION WORKER

Who Came to Oregon
in the Good Ship
Lausannee

Passes to the Beyond and
Her Memory Will be Appropriately
Honored

Mrs. Helen C. McClane, one of Salem's oldest and most respected residents, died in this city at 1:10 o'clock this morning, after an acute attack of erysipelas, after an illness of but a few days, surrounded at the last by her family.

About five years ago Mrs. McClane was thrown from a buggy, and since that time her left side has been, in a measure, paralyzed. During the past summer she again fell, and since that time has been weak, but her condition was not alarming, and she gave promise of enjoying life and the care of her children for several years more. Last Friday, however, she suffered an attack of the disease that finally proved her undoing, and she gradually sank until she passed away, as stated above. Deceased was a pioneer of the early days of Oregon, and saw this state grow from a wilderness to its present high state. She was a native of Otsego county, New York, where she was born April 14, 1834, and six years later she came to Oregon with the missionary party that came around Cape Horn in the good ship Lausannee, and landed in Astoria, at the mouth of the Columbia river, in the early summer of 1840. Her parents were Rev. and Mrs. L. H. Judson, and they were of the party that included the late Rev. J. L. Parrish.

After disembarking the party located at the old Methodist mission north of this city, and a little later removed to Salem, where Mrs. McClane has since that time resided. Her father built the old Mission mill, which stood until 1865 across from the R. P. Boise residence in North Salem, which is the oldest house in the city today.

In 1849 she became the wife of the late J. B. McClane, and a happy union resulted, the fruits of which are one daughter and six sons, all grown and occupying positions of honor and trust in the world, good citizens, as are the descendants of the pioneers throughout the Northwest. They are Mrs. J. H. McCormick, of Salem; G. F. McClane, of Salem; C. H. McClane, of James L. McClane and John B. McClane, of Salem; O. H. McClane, of Grand Ronde, and Harold G. McClane, of Portland. The husband of deceased died a number of years ago, and since that time Mrs. McClane has lived with her sons and daughter, her last years being made as pleasant as filial love and care could make them.

Mrs. McClane was a charter member of the Oregon Pioneer Society, and one of its most honored members. She was a life-long member of the Methodist church, and one of its most devoted adherents.
