Filipino Flagellants.

According to a report received at the war department from Lieutenant C. M. Barney, of the medical department, now stationed at Fort Schuyler, N. Y., and formerly on duty in the Philippines, the custom of flagellation is still prevalent among the Filipinos, especially during Holy Week. While in Bulacan province, says the New York Times, Lieutenant Barney had an opportunity to witness this practice, in regard to which he says:

"A person falls ill, for example, and he promises the Deity that if he gets well he will perform penance of such and such kind and such days of Holy Week for so many years. Or, if he has an enemy whom he wishes to get rid of, he vows that if this enemy dies he will drag a ball and chain, or flagellate himself, or perform some other penance on Holy Thursday every year during the rest of his life. Back of the small chapel, called 'visita,' which exists in every village, he begins his penance.

"With his face covered, to prevent recognition, stripped to the waist, and no clothing but loose, thin, white cotton trousers, one finds him standing with his arms folded, head bowed forward, and his body bent, while an everyday looking native slaps him on the back till the blood comes into the skin. Then he is spatted with a piece of wood with little metal points in it till his back is macerated and the blood runs freely. Then he starts on a day's journey from 'visita' to 'visita.' He is certainly a weird and barbaric spectacle, as he silently and slowly stalks along, with covered face, swinging from side to side a cord, into the end of which is braided a bunch of sticks about the size of pencils, which strike his bare, bleeding back with a loud sound at every step, and macerate it so that the blood oozes down and soaks his white trousers.

"At short intervals he prostrates himself in the dust, utters some unintelligible jargon, possibly a prayer, while the everyday looking citizen pats him on the back and on the soles of his feet with a flail as he grovels there. Again, the outlandish figure goes through grotesque contortions or progresses by handsprings. When he comes to a spring or ditch, he plunges into it, and whenever he reaches a 'visita,' he grovels before it and spends much time in prayer.

"One may see these flagellants lying prostrate in the dust for long periods at a time. But the chief picture one carries in mind is an erect native with covered face, bare, bloody, brown back and blood-stained trousers, stalking slowly forward along the bamboo-fringed roads to the rhythmic accompaniment of the swinging scourge, while from every house for miles comes a weird monotone ill, which represents the chanting of the passion."

Murder Will Out.

Mrs. Molly Andrews, formerly Miss Nellie Conrad, made a confession just before her death which clears up the mystery connected with a tragedy that in 1885 caused much excitement in the southern part of the state, says a news dispatch from Jasper, Indiana. Stanford Freeman, a young farmer of this county, was called to his gate by two men and two women the night before he was to be married, and after a scuffle with them he was found by his intended bride with several wounds from a knife and with his skull fractured in several places. He died without revealing the identity of his slayers, who had ridden swiftly away.

Mrs. Andrews said that she was one of the party which visited Freeman; that one of the men who was present is dead, and the other is in the Tennessee state prison. The woman who accompanied them, she said, and who disappeared several years ago, was murdered because of fear lest she betray the murderers. Mrs. Andrews said that she was in love with Freeman and one of the men was in love with Freeman's intended wife, and when they went to the gate that night a demand was made that Freeman marry her at once. When he refused he was fatally stabbed and the four had kept the secret so well that no suspicion was aroused.

The Turk Should Go.

It is reported that Austria has prepared a joint note of the powers warning Bulgaria and Turkey that in the event of war neither of them will be supported, but the status quo will be maintained. Turkey will not be allowed to overrun Bulgaria and the Bulgarians will not be permitted to lay hands on Macedonia. That territory is not for them.

A status quo which involves the continued possession of Macedonia by the Turks, who will govern it badly, is not worth preserving. The sooner it is ended the better it will be for the peace of the inhabitants, whether they are Christians or Mohammedans. It will be more to the purpose to let the status quo go and divide the remaining European territories of the sultan between Austria and Russia, the one taking most of Macedonia with Salonica, a port is greatly coveted, and the
