IRON WORKERS LIMIT

The Power of Executive Committee to call Strikes

Kansas City, Oct. 1.—When President Buchanan convened the Iron Workers today he definitely decided to run for re-election. French, of San Francisco, is, therefore, out of the race. The Parks element is rallying around Donnelly, of Albany. Buchanans claim 47 out of 83 votes. The Iron Workers' convention today passed a considerable limitation of the powers of the president by constitutional amendment, by which all general strike orders, and all national working agreements, must be ratified by vote of delegates from each lodge in the country before it is effective. Hitherto the sole power was in the executive board. A uniform initiation fee of \$25 is established.

GALLON CAN OF EXPLOSIVE

Found on the Tracks of the Northern Pacific Railroad

Butte, Oct. 1.—A gallon can of nitroglycerine was found on the track of the Northern Pacific railroad six miles east of high trestle. Persons who for some weeks have repeatedly attempted, in various parts of the state to dynamite the Northern Pacific trains, were believed to be guilty. The explosive was found by a track walker shortly before the passage of the North Coast limited.

SEATTLE STRIKE CAUSES

Labor Union to Desert Steel Carrying and go into Groceries

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 1.—Street car men, frozen out in the recent strike, have formed a co-operative company, with a capital of \$50,000, to operate a grocery business.

Seattle Milkmen Held for Murder

Seattle, Oct. 1.—Milkman Hoppe and Farmer Smith, held responsible for the death of little Carrie Consanctine, by a coroner's jury, will be arrested for selling formaldehyde milk, under the state law. If developments further implicate them in the poisoning of the baby, they may be held on a charge of murder.

Mexican Railroads Consolidated

City of Mexico, Oct. 1.—The consolidation of the Mexican International railroad and the National railroad of Mexico became effective today. Henceforth the International is to be operated from the general offices of the National in this city.

Three Brothers Were Executed

Danemorro, N. T., Oct. 1.—The three Van Wormer boys were executed this morning. Willis, who was the weakest, went first. Frederick next, and Burton last. The triple execution took place within 15 minutes.
