THE LESSON FOR SALEM.

The reports of the state board of health, as published in a Portland paper, have worked an incalculable injury to the city of Salem.

The damage to this city from this single publication will be at least \$100,000 to property, and the harm still to come will be greater.

A city has no protection against such official vandalism, and we presume this city will have to put up with more of it.

Some steps should be taken by the city to protect itself against the repetition of such reports and their publication and their further spread.

All the good work done in advertising the city by our chamber of commerce organization is more than counteracted by such reports.

The effect of these official reports as to the spread of disease by impure water will be felt for years to come.

Medical journals and official bulletins will contain the statements of the state board of health, uncontradicted by the Salem member of that board.

Only a short time ago the state board of health stated that the well water was bad, but the river water was good. Now they state that both river and well water is bad, but the wells at the state institutions are all right.

Where are we at? Why is the whole blackening of the sanitary condition of the Willamette valley centered on Salem? If the people of Salem can be roused to action and self-defense, some good may result by detracting the city.

Nothing is published by this attacking state board of health in favor of our city, or in favor of its healthfulness. The reports of the board show our state institutions to be in excellent condition.

The Salem member has been official physician at the Chemawa school for a few months, and it is well known that that institution has been under good sanitary management before his connection therewith. In eight years there has not been a fever case originating in the school.

For years, under Superintendent Potter, there was very little sickness there, most of the time the hospital being empty, and sometimes not a death.

Out of hundreds of Chemawa girls working at Salem in that time, but three have had fever.

This only proves that, taken from every standpoint, Salem does not deserve to be branded as the most unhealthy locality in Oregon by an official body, and, still worse, advertised broadcast.

How to undo the harm that has been done in the question? Some public action should be taken to counteract the evil effect of these wide-spread official publications.

Surely if the real facts in favor of Salem could be given as wide publicity it would undo part of the incalculable damage that has been done.

Salem people should take whatever steps are necessary to make it impossible to have a recurrence of such detrimental advertising.

ESTABLISH THE KINDERGARTENS.

The meeting at the Presbyterian church parlors Saturday afternoon to establish a kindergarten association should be well patronized.

There is not enough interest taken in this city in the educational conditions surrounding the little children.

The kindergarten is the mediator between the family and society—the missing link in the educational system.

It takes the mothers and the little ones and leads them hand in hand along the right road—makes the right start from whence all good results in life must follow.

THE METHODIST CHURCH.

The Methodist conference in our city is one of the most interesting gatherings of men that can be found assembled in any community.

The organization of the Methodist church, its systematic struggle for the salvation of souls in the city and country, make it unique.

From the days of Wesley to the present it has been a pathfinder for all the other Protestant churches, a converter of raw material unto Christ.

Wesley's greatest battle was against the vices of his times that were brutalizing humanity in England. He fought for great moral reforms.

The movement for independent churches, dissenting religiously and politically from the church of England was another keynote of Methodism.

The tendency to the complete separation of church and state received the greatest impetus among English-speaking people from the Methodists.

The Methodist minister of today is different from the pioneer propagandist of free salvation. He is an educated man—a thinker on all lines.

His church discipline makes him a student of human nature, and by this he becomes a natural ruler of men, and gains increasing influence.

As much as, if not more than, any other denomination, the Methodist ministry, are readers of the daily newspapers, patrons of education, and good business men. Some of them are politicians.

TAKE CARE OF THE ROADS.

It is one thing to build good roads. It is another thing to take care of them.

The county now builds roads. It does next to nothing toward taking care of them.

In a precinct the road supervisor will expend from five to eight hundred dollars of public taxes on building roads, and then do nothing ten months in the year to keep them in order.

Take one process that ruins the roads—tracking. The wagons driven over the roads are allowed to run in the wheel track until the road is ruined.

This can only be obviated by building the roads, and caring for them so they will wear all over the surface equally, and not track.

The county court should take a part of the appropriation for each road district and spend it in hiring some competent person to go over the roads and keep them in order.

It pays the railroad company to have a force of men to keep its tracks in order. Why not the county to look after the roads it builds?

The Journal believes that one-fourth of the appropriation for each road district expended in this way would do more for good roads than all the rest of the appropriation as it is now spent.

Who would build a house, and then neglect to keep it in repair? The one character in history to do that was the Arkansas fiddler. When it rained, he couldn't do it. When it was dry the house didn't need repairs.

Let the county court give this a trial. Try it in one district for three months this fall, and note the result. We are confident it will be satisfactory.

COMMITTED TO HOME.

Ida Nyland and Lucy Martin Surrendered to Authorities.

An Astoria special says: Ida Nyland and Lucy Martin, two of the girls involved in the revolting criminal prosecutions at the present term of the circuit court, were committed to the care of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, of Portland, by County Judge Trenchard. The petition for their commitment was made by District Attorney Harrison Allen and Sheriff Linville.

The petition stated that the girls are incorrigible, and that their respective parents have abused the parental authority over them by permitting each to run about the streets and consort with men, and have otherwise failed to exercise any restrictions whatever, with the result that they have absolutely no control over them. In view of these distressing facts the petitioners recited that they believed the best interests of society would be conserved by vesting the care and responsibility of the children in others, until such time as they reform or reach legal age.

It is believed that if the girls are re-

moved from the contaminating environment and companions with whom they have been thrown in Astoria, they will reform, as it is not thought they are incorrigible at heart. It was with this in mind, and a desire to save them from careers of shame and degradation that the district attorney consented to their commitment to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, rather than to the state reform school. They will be taken to Portland tomorrow, and are now at liberty on their own recognizances.

ESCAPED FROM ASYLUM.

Charles Winter, Committed from Astoria, Returns and is Captured.

(Astoria News, Sept. 30th.)
Patrolman Thompson last night picked up a man named Charles Winter, who escaped from the insane asylum at Salem a few days ago. When he decided to seek another boarding place he took with him a long knife, but was captured before occasion arose for him to use it.

Winter was committed from Astoria September 29, 1902, one year ago, and since that time has escaped twice. The first time he eluded the vigilance of the guard was June 10th, last. He is a fisherman by occupation. His hallucination consists of talking to himself and laughing by the hour. Insomnia is said to be the cause of his aberration.

He was turned over to Sheriff Linville this morning, and is now in the county jail, awaiting the arrival of guards from Salem to take him back.
