**SALEM Y. M. C. A. ACTIVE**

Work in all the Departments is Progressing

Gymnasium Classes in Day and Night Work Have Been Organized

The Salem Young Men's Christian Association entered upon its work for the coming season with the brightest prospects of any previous year. Last Sunday the first meeting for men was held, and was largely attended. Instead of the regular address by a pastor, several business men gave short practical talks as to the value of Bible study. The purpose of the meeting was to stimulate a greater interest in Bible study, and at the close three Bible classes were organized, which will take up regular courses of study, covering a period of six months.

The night school, which has become a special feature of the association work, opened on Monday night, and students have been entering the various classes during the week. The number of students enrolled is almost double the number that entered the first week of last year. Arrangements have just been completed for classes in shorthand and typewriting, for which there seems to be considerable demand. This class will begin work next Monday night, and a number of students have already been enrolled.

The gymnasium has been the scene of the greatest activity during the week, and Mr. Markle, the new physical director, recently from Freeport, Ill., is highly pleased with the prospects. He says the gymnasium is better than that of the average association, and there is no reason why a large work should not be done. The evening classes for young men opened Tuesday, with a large attendance. The afternoon class for students was started Friday, and the boys' classes on Wednesday. Other classes that will be organized immediately is a class for business men in the afternoon, and possibly in the evening, and a working boys' class. Every member, before taking up physical work, is given a thorough examination, including measurements and strength tests, examination of heart, lungs and other organs; also the record of abnormal conditions of chest, back, shoulders, hips, etc. A carefully prepared measurement chart is given, and exercises prescribed to correct abnormalities and build up the weak parts. Classes are open to all members of the association, without extra charge.

There are other privileges which the association offers, such as reading room and library, also socials, entertainments, etc. A young man is given every opportunity to improve himself, physically, mentally, spiritually, socially and otherwise, and the cost of membership is so low that any young man can afford to belong.

The boys' department will be made a special feature this year, and separate rooms equipped for their exclusive use. A number of other changes are being made in the arrangements of the rooms, which will be a great improvement when completed.

Healthy Condition of the Treasury is Shown to Exist

County Treasurer Richardson has completed his semi-annual statement of the financial condition of Marion county, showing the receipts and disbursements of the treasury for the six months ending September 30th.
