

COURT TERM OPENS

But Few of the Cases are Ready for Trial

Many Motions Disposed of, and the Docket Arranged for the Convenience of Litigants

The first department of the circuit court met in the adjourned July term at the court house this morning, with Judge Burnett on the bench. The docket was called, and a number of cases disposed of. Only a few cases were found ready for trial, while in the cases against Chas. Scott, brought by the Bank of Woodburn, A. Bush, et al., and Coolidge & McClaine, orders were entered to sell the attached property, owing to default on the part of the defendant, judgment being entered. Dirty Dora in a Savage Mood

One Cady, who conducted the 'Dirty Dora, the Wild Girl,' exhibition at the district fair has vamoosed with the plunder, leaving his consort more savage than ever, and with excellent prospects of devouring additional gobs of mundane in lieu of nourishment more to his liking.

The "exhibition" was the most palatable fake ever foisted upon the public. The alleged Dora was a young man, rather comely of face, who stared up at his audiences from beneath a mask of yellow ochre liberally applied. The "mud," which he devoured with great gusto consisted of a mixture of grape nut and blackberry juice. This was placed in a small trough, surrounded by the real article. The mud surrounding the sham article was passed out to the people as souvenirs, a clever dodge by a precious pair of rogues.

A Big Hatchery.

An interesting description of the new Ontario hatchery appears in the Oregonian. The hatchery covers 11 acres of ground along the bank of the Snake river, and is provided with 320 troughs, which hold 60,000,000 eggs. The plant is the largest of its kind in existence. It is usually calculated that from 5 to 10 per cent of the fish artificially propagated return to the river, the remainder meeting death before reaching maturity. Should 66,000,000 eggs ever be handled at Ontario in any one season, more than 4,500,000 salmon could be reasonably figured as the result—more than three times the number of fish that were caught in the Columbia during the 1903 spring season. The immense possibilities of the work can be judged from this statement. In value the full output from the Ontario hatchery would be worth about \$10,000,000 in the markets.

Foot Amputated.

Ernest Folsom suffered the amputation of a portion of his foot yesterday, Dr. Horsfall performing the operation, assisted by Dr. Mingus and Miss Porch.

While working at the Minard & Folsom mill, three miles below Dora, last Monday, the young man was lifting a heavy cant, when his foot slipped, and the bottom of it came in contact with the circular saw, cutting a gash into the bones near the toe. He was taken to Myrtle Point, where the physician endeavored to save the foot, with the result that gangrene set in, and amputation became necessary. The foot was taken off back of the instep, leaving the heel intact. If it heals without further trouble, the young man will not be badly crippled. His brother, Bert Folsom, is with him.—Coast Mail.

Salem Girl in Boston.

Miss Hortense Kimball, a Salem girl, who is studying vocal music in Boston, writes to a friend that she is enjoying her work very much. She was recently one of a party of prominent people who took a trolley ride to Providence, R. I., in the private car of Mr. Prentice, who owns most of the lines in three states. Of the party was a Mrs. Thielens, sister-in-law of the Salem Thielens, and who lived in Portland until two years ago. Mr. Thielens is superintendent of one of the lines. The name of the private palace car was the "Oregon." Miss Kimball was entertained at the palatial home of the Prentices.

Option Held by Northern.

It may be interesting news to most readers to learn that the Northern Pacific railroad has an option on the Columbia River & Northern, which at present extends from Lyle, Wash., to Goldendale, Wash. The line is generally believed to belong to the O. R. & N., but nothing to corroborate this has ever been discovered, further than that a traffic understanding between the two lines has been arrived at, and, if purchased by the Northern Pacific, will doubtless be extended to Ellensburg, to connect with the main line.

Will Test the Law.

A suit to test the law taxing corporations will probably be brought soon by District Attorney John Manning, of Multnomah county, against the Portland tannery, which, acting under the advice of Charles J. Schnabel, has refused to comply with the act, in order to obtain a decision by the courts as to its constitutionality. It is stated that quite a number of corporations have declined to pay the license, but will abide by the decision of the supreme court, if it sustains the law, and pay the amount due.

Ship Surgeon's Duties.

Newark, N. J., Oct. 5.—A suit to determine the right of a captain of a naval vessel to order a ship's surgeon to perform other than his professional duties came up for trial in the United States district court here today. The

action is brought by Dr. R. N. Shepard, a surgeon formerly employed on a United States revenue cutter against Captain Voelker, the commander of the vessel.

According to the surgeon's contention the ship was detailed to carry a geological survey to foreign coasts, and he was asked by the captain to take part in the soundings. He demurred, whereupon he was ordered to do so, and refused. When the cutter returned to American waters he was discharged by the government authorities, upon representations of the captain. The case involves an interesting point, and the decision is awaited with much interest in naval circles.

THE HOP MARKET.

The Journal received a telegram from Albert Bing, of New York, this morning, saying that the hop market was steady, with prices firm and a strong tendency.

With prices from 22 to 27½ cents per pound a great many hops will change hands this month. No grower need hesitate to sell on the rising market, because when it turns the needs of the trade will be met.

The Journal does not advise speculation in hops by any grower, and it is not necessary to say that holding hops for 30 cents a pound is rank speculation.

Oregon Meat for the East

La Grande, Thursday—Thirty-two carloads of sheep left La Grande this morning for the East. Eighteen to twenty cars will follow in a few days.

The sheep were purchased from the wool growers in the Grand Ronde valley and Wallowa county.

This morning's shipment was loaded at Elgin yesterday morning, and was hustled on through with the regular stock train. They will be taken to Omaha. They were in fine condition, and will be used for mutton in the Omaha markets.

The second shipment to follow was purchased by Frank Hurts, a Nebraska sheep owner. They will be taken to Gibbon, Nebraska, where they will be fed on Nebraska corn, after which they will be sold in the Omaha markets as they become marketable.

These deals are regarded as significant in more ways than one. In the first place Oregon sheep are in demand. In the second place mutton sheep are scarce, and in the third place feed is scarce in Eastern Oregon this season. The prices paid are not ascertained, though it is reported that they were thoroughly satisfactory to the local sheep men.
