

FOUND JUST IN TIME

Ex-Mayor Doud of Woodburn Lost for Three Days

Wandered Aimlessly in the Woods and During a Steady Downpour of Rain

At noon Tuesday the citizens of Woodburn received the joyful news that Jason F. Doud, ex-mayor of the city, who had been lost in the mountains since Saturday morning, October 3d, had been found. He arrived here at 3 o'clock p. m. in an exhausted condition.

Mayor Corby, ex-Mayor Doud, who is over 70 years of age, Amos Beach, city marshal and Mr. Menier had been hunting for deer near the Red Rock mine, east of Crooked Finger prairie, some 35 miles east of this city. On Saturday Mr. Doud shot a deer, as did another of the party, and the hunters started for camp. Doud concluded to go over a high bluff to reach camp, while his companions took a circuitous, but easier, route with the game killed. On arrival at camp the ex-mayor had not arrived. Guns were fired, and search commenced at once.

Beach came to Woodburn, and several citizens at once started on the search. The ex-mayor was found at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon by Mayor Corby, who carried him to camp on his back, a distance of nearly two miles. Mr. Doud gives a graphic account of his awful exposure and wanderings. He says: "I started toward camp, but soon became bewildered. For hours I wandered in the awful storm, firing my gun at intervals. That night I built a fire, but, being without food, became very weak and chilled."

"On Sunday I endeavored again to reach camp, but without success. The storm increased in violence, and when night came on I could not for my life light a match, on account of tremulousness and extreme weakness. Without shelter or cover I wandered around all night, and when morning came made up my bed of leaves and

laid down to meet death upon the mountain side.

"The sound of Mayor Corby's rifle and his cheerful voice aroused me, but I was absolutely helpless when found, and life could not have been sustained many hours. I had no food from Saturday morning until Monday night, exposed to the awful storm that raged with increasing fury around me."

Ex-Mayor Jason F. Doud is a member of Stevens Post, G. A. R., and served with distinction in the Civil War. He and all others of the party were experienced hunters and mountaineers. He is resting easily and his entire recovery from his terrible sufferings seems assured.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVORERS.

Begin Their Work for an Active Field and Winter Campaign.

The Christian Endeavorers of Salem are actively engaged in getting their work under way for the winter campaign, and the C. E. union of the city held their first business conference and meeting after the summer vacation in the Y. M. C. A. parlors last night. President Walter T. Jenks having the meeting in charge.

The local union comprises the following societies: Presbyterian, Baptist, Congregational, Friends, United Evangelical and Christian, nearly all of which were represented by two or more members at last night's meeting. The most important feature of the session was the election of officers, who are as follows:

The presidents of the various societies are also vice-presidents of the union.

As soon as the new officers get the work in hand, some work of importance along several lines, is to be undertaken, and it is desired that every officer of every society be represented at the next meeting, which will be held the first Tuesday in November. The union also desires the co-operation of the pastors of the city, and will especially invite them to be present at the next meeting, when one of the pastors will probably address the meeting.

Prunes Shipped to London.

The Dalles, Or., Oct. 7.—Highly interesting and satisfactory returns have just been received by R. H. Weber, of this city, on a carload shipment of Hungarian and Italian prunes, which were sent by him for The Dalles Fruit Growers' Union some weeks ago to a New York firm for sale there. Upon arrival in New York the fruit was found to be in such prime condition that the venture was made of forwarding it to London.

The advice now received is that the fruit arrived there fresh and perfect, and was sold in the London market, the Hungarian prunes bringing six shillings on an average per crate, or \$1.50; the Italian prunes from the Weber orchard selling for six shillings six pence, or \$1.60, the buying price being \$1.25 and 90 cents, respectively. As far as can be ascertained, this is the first carload of fresh prunes that has ever been shipped direct from Oregon to England, and gives a wholly

new idea to the growers of this vicinity, whose prune crop has heretofore been marketed in Eastern states.

Mr. Weber expressed his intention of giving the experiment a further trial next year, and has persuaded another progressive fruitgrower of this city to join with him in risking a carload of prunes in the new venture.

So far this year about 50 carloads of prunes have left The Dalles for Eastern points, most of them finding market in New York City, although some have been shipped to Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis and Pittsburg. The prune crop in this vicinity has averaged about 15 per cent in advance of last year, and is now practically disposed of.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Miss James Appointed Matron.

Governor Chamberlain yesterday afternoon appointed Miss Irene James as matron of the penitentiary. This action was in compliance with a law

passed at the last session of the legislature, the new officer to look after the welfare of the female prisoners, and to see that they have proper care and secure the necessary exercise outside of their cells. One of the female prisoners is in poor health, as a result of the close confinement, and it was thought best to make arrangements to give her proper exercise.

Miss James is a daughter of the superintendent of the prison, and a young lady who will do good service for the state. The governor thought it best to appoint some one already educated in the prison, rather than an outside lady, who would find the association of the personnel at the penitentiary less pleasant on account of being a stranger to the men.

H. C. Bressler, the motorman, and family are home from a week spent as matron of the penitentiary, for action was in compliance with a law miles west of Monmouth.
