REPORT ON NEW BERRIES

(Concluded from page six.)

plant stock the Ruby has developed into the greatest bearer of all my varieties. The same proved true on Mr. Walker's place in East Salem. All who saw my field said the Ruby surpassed all others in amount and beauty of berries. We repeatedly picked two and three crates from a row 220 feet long. They make a beautiful market berry and will stand shipment to Portland. They are very late coming in after the best varieties are entirely out of market, and thus will be a most profitable kind to grow. After seeing about all the strawberry patches in Western Oregon, we can positively declare that we have seen nothing that begins to bear with the Ruby.

Best French Shipper.

No. 12, Paris, St.—This is one of the best varieties ever imported from France. It has been grown at Salem for several years for the market, and is a very valuable late variety. It took the market at one of our finest groceries, and was a very fine showy berry in the crate. For the table it is unequalled, having a rich, sweet creamy flesh, and an inviting reddish orange color. It is solid and will bear shipment, but too large for canning. The Paris again sustained its reputation, taking the highest price in the local market. It has small roots, seeming to make the crop out of air and sunshine. It has the most beautiful blooms, sets fruit quickly, and matures it fast. A most showy or orange red berry and possesses a rich creamy flesh for eating fresh. Ships well, but is not a canner. Following extract is from a letter from the Pearson-Page Co., of Portland, that handled hundreds of crates of the Paris berry grown at Salem:

"The two crates Paris were shipped in the country at \$1.25. Regarding this Paris berry we think you have got a good thing in this, and if we were in the berry growing business ourselves, we would not be afraid to put out 10 or 20 acres of this good solid shipping stock."

Fine Oregon Variety.

No. 13, Magoon, St.—Best late shipping and home market berry. Like the Paris and Joe, it has immense growth of foliage and the great plants in hill culture some times turn off a gallon of berries to the plant. It is a large brick red, and was one of the showiest berries in the crate ever shipped from Salem. It is very popular in the Portland market. This Oregon variety held its own in this market, and produced the largest, darkest red and showy berries of any. By all means have some Magoon in your patch.

A Spanish Strawberry.

No. 14, Cervera, St.—This came to me with an unpronounceable Spanish name, and I changed it to the name of the gallant Spanish admiral. It is the darkest red, most luscious table berry I have ever seen. When dead ripe it is fairly black in color, and a dark liver red clear through, and the greatest delicacy in the form of a berry ever put to the lips. In very wet seasons it molds, but worthy a place in any garden. Too soft for canning or shipment. Was conceded by all who tried it the finest and most luscious table berry ever produced in Oregon. Is a large bearer and a few dozen plants will supply a family over a long period. The last pickings of dead ripe berries are almost black, so rich are they in sweetness and coloring matter, while the flesh has a delicious firmness, blood red all through.

A Double-Cropper.

No. 15, Double-Cropper, St.—This variety was a freak advertised by Childs, the florist, and at first refused to produce anything but a crop of fine dark red high-flavored berries and in great abundance. I let H. W. Savage have some plants, and in a few years he reported selling \$100 worth off a small patch, after all other berries were out of the market. This result was obtained in ordinary field culture, and without irrigation, except by the Oregon mist. I procured some plants from him, as I had not considered them of any special value among so many other good varieties, and had thrown them out. Now I consider them a most valuable kind to prolong the market supply. I am often asked if this is the Oregon Everbearing. No it is what its name implies. After the first crop is off, the tops should be mowed off close, water put on the field after it is cultivated, and there will be a second crop in September or the latter part of August. Very profitable near a city market.

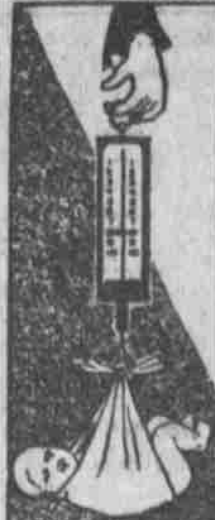
