NEW YORK'S RUBBISH

PRIVILEGE OF SORTING DUMPS
SOLD TO AN ITALIAN.

A Queer Mine Which the Contractor Pays \$50,000 a Year for Working—The Business Said to Pay at Least Twenty-Five Per Cent on the Investment.

The household rubbish and the street-sweepings of New York are carted to the 13 river dumps. The most important of these are the ones at 110th street and the East River, and the one at the foot of Canal street. The former receives the waste of the immense apartment-residence district, and the latter that of the big downtown warehouse and pier district. The privilege of sorting the rubbish at all the dumps is sold to an Italian contractor, who pays above fifty thousand dollars a year for it. He sublets the privilege of going over different classes of household rubbish to other Italians interested in various industries. The paper-maker, for instance, pays him for manila, straw, old paper and the like. The work has to be done in a hurry, and it is supposed that much escapes even the trained and vigilant eyes of the "pickers and trimmers," as they are called; but enough profit is derived to enable them to return to the chief contractor a profit of twenty-five per cent upon his investment.

This part of the business has not always been accomplished without scandal. Only last summer, under the all-searching eye of a reform administration, it was learned that some of the sub-contractors were thriftily employing children on the dumps at about fifty cents a week. These unfortunate little waifs not only received next to nothing for their labor, but practically lived on the dumps in surroundings which one may without undue vehemence describe as unspeakably foul. Reports that they were even eating chance bits of kitchen refuse was also circulated.

Not all the household rubbish and the street-sweepings are taken from the dumps out to sea. Six per cent of it is brought to a refuse crematory at the foot of East 18th street, established as an experiment by Colonel Waring, who first placed the New York street cleaning department on a sanitary and civilized working basis. In this six per cent of the total waste, even after it has been sorted by the argus-eyed employees of the Italian contractors, there is enough valuable material to cause another contractor to pay four thousand dollars a year to the city for the privilege of still further sorting it. Here the sorting is done by machinery. The rubbish is whirled around on a long, wide belt, from which the pickers and trimmers seize what is of value to them.—Woman's Home Companion.

To Maryland Valor.
Chattanooga, Tenn., Oct. 8.—The handsome monument erected at Orchard Knob to the joint memory of the Federal and Confederate troops of Maryland, who fought and fell on the historic battlefields about Missionary Ridge, was dedicated today with impressive ceremonies in the presence of a large delegation of prominent men from Maryland and distinguished visitors from Georgia, North Carolina, Alabama and Tennessee, including several governors, accompanied by their staffs. Governor Smith, of Maryland, delivered the address.

The monument commemorates the valor of the Third Maryland Union Infantry Regiment and the Third Maryland Confederate Battery, which were the two commands from Maryland which took part in the battle of Chickamauga. The base of the monument is 15 feet square and 5 feet high. On top of this is a 40-foot column of Maryland granite, capped with a heroic bronze figure, carrying a furling flag. Around the base are handsome bronze figures of Confederate soldiers.
