Ohio Campaign Grows Hot.
Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 10.—From now until election day politics in the Buckeye state will continue to boil over. The Democrats have been having a lively time of it this week, with Mr. Bryan speaking in two and sometimes four towns in a day, while a similar record has been kept up by Tom L. Johnson and by other candidates on the state ticket. The Hanna-Herrick-Harding forces have not been idle, but beginning tonight they promise to set a new pace for their opponents. Republicans of national prominence have been pressed into service, some coming from Washington and others from Indiana and neighboring states. Secretary Shaw is to devote a week to the campaign, making his first speech at Cleveland tonight, appearing on the same platform with Senator Hanna at the South End, a stronghold of the Johnson forces. Other spellbinders who are expected to tour the state within the next few weeks in support of the Republican ticket and Senator Hanna's campaign for re-election are Senator Fairbanks, of Indiana, "Uncle Joe" Cannon, of Illinois, and Secretaries Moody and Wilson.

Mr. Kruger's Birthday
Paris, Oct. 10.—How swiftly even the most famous of men pass from the public mind when they are no longer in the limelight is evidenced by the fact that very few if anyone noticed the anniversary today of Mr. Kruger, former president of the Transvaal Republic, whereas the same occasion but one or two years ago was marked by public demonstrations and a flood of congratulatory messages. Mr. Kruger was born Oct. 10, 1825 and consequently this is his seventy-eighth birthday. He is living very quietly at his villa in the south of France. For a while his place was the mecca for Boer leaders and for Frenchmen and others who desired to show their sympathy for England's fallen enemy, but of late Mr. Kruger has received very few callers. He has never fully recovered from the shock of his wife's death and the most of his time is spent in reading the Bible and in reverie.
