FIRST DENIZENS OF COAST

Berkeley to Study the First Families of California

Their History Lies in The Caves, Shell Mounds, and Debris of Ancient Homes

The University of California department of archaeology has just made a public appeal to persons in all parts of the state and adjacent regions to give aid in a comprehensive ethnological survey of California, which shall materially help the members of the department in determining the important problems on which they are now bending all their energies. The object of this research is to obtain a knowledge of the first peopling of the Pacific Coast and of the early migrations, and of the relationship of the recent and the present Indians—a study which is required by anthropologists and by all interested in the early history of man.

That the work is peculiarly pressing at the present time is stated in the appeal of the department, as follows: "Nowhere in America has there been such a diversity of Indian languages as in California—a condition which has long puzzled anthropologists. During the past five years more investigations of these languages have been made than in all previous time. These Indian languages are now fast disappearing. Several are at present moment known only by five or six, and others by twenty or thirty individuals, and hardly a year passes without some special dialect or even language becoming extinct. For this reason it is desired that students should be instructed in the methods of recording and studying Indian languages, and then devote themselves to special research. The University is therefore giving instruction in this branch of linguistics with the hope of preparing students to carry on the researches before the opportunities pass away."

The gathering of material for a first-class working museum is now a matter of prime importance. Systematic explorations are being made by the experts of the department in the later gravel deposits, in several limestone caves and in the ancient shell heaps of the primitive Indians. The languages of the existing tribes are being studied; the customs and mythology of the different tribes are being recorded and collections illustrating their arts are being formed for the museum. A study of the physical characters of the various groups of aborigines, combined with that of the skeletons found during the archaeological explorations, is being made in order to determine the physical relations of the Indians of California with those of other regions. By correlating the physical characters, the particular cultures of the past and the present Indians, and the various linguistic stocks or families still extant, it is hoped to solve the great problem of the relationship of the different groups of Indians in California and their relationship as a whole with peoples of other parts of the continent, and possibly with certain tribes of Asia.

In the belief that great assistance could be rendered in a timely fashion by the inhabitants of the different sections of the state, the University authorities have made the general appeal for co-operation. They have asked for information relating to the location of caves, shell heaps, old burial places, ancient village sites and scattered fragments or survivors of nearly extinct tribes. Specimens are also asked for and arrangements have been made with Wells, Fargo & Co. to carry to the University from all points in California, Oregon, Arizona and Nevada all material addressed to the anthropological department, at the Affiliated Colleges, in San Francisco, provided it does not weigh more than fifty pounds. These objects, when carefully labeled as to where and how found, would, on comparative study, often aid in determining the distribution of a tribe or group of which other records may be lost or so uncertain that just such confirmatory evidence to establish a particular point is required.
