GERMAN HOP MARKET

Bavarian Products are Rapidly Picked up

Following letter was received from Bernhard Bing, Nuernberg, Germany, September 24th:

Hop picking is entirely completed. The weather we had during picking was rather favorable, and the product harvested is of superior and perfectly sound quality.

Our market opened with a very strong demand for all grades. Buyers are very active on our Bavarian producing points, and prices advanced 25 to 30 marks all around. Owing to this year's small crop in Bohemia, the Austrian breweries are the principal buyers for our hops; planters, therefore, are very reserved, and look for higher prices.

With a quiet but firm tendency we today quote per 50 kg., first cost: Choice quality, 220 to 250 marks per cwt.

Good qualities, 180 to 200 marks per cwt.

Medium qualities, 140 to 170 marks per cwt. Yours faithfully,

Frenchmen Get Wild

Armentiers, France, Oct. 13.—The linen strikers today held the city in a reign of terror. Seven thousand banded together, attacked and sacked the principal factories, setting fire to four. The government commissary attempted to intervene, and narrowly escaped lynching. The authorities relieved the difficulty with troops. There were a number of street collisions, and a score were wounded.

Street Cars do Damage

Greensburg, Pa., Oct. 13.—In a dense fog the Greensburg street cars collided, south of the latter place, in a suburb. Motorman Hirsch was instantly killed, and Motorman Rowe had his leg cut off, and was badly crushed; two others were injured.

Tennessee Collision

Chattanooga, Tenn., Oct. 13.—The Lookout Mountain cars collided at St. Elmo this morning, and four were seriously injured. Emil Andrews, a boy of 14, fatally. Two jumped off the high bridge where the trains collided.

Wants to Be Free.

Fannie Sumner, plaintiff, vs. J. C. Sumner, defendant, is the title of a new divorce suit filed today. The plaintiff alleges that she was married to defendant in Linn county, Missouri, August 10, 1877, and there are five children, four of them minors. She alleges cruel and inhuman treatment, and asks for a divorce and the custody of the minor children. The parties to the divorce proceeding are residents of Salem, and the plaintiff is conducting a boarding house here.

Question of Style.

The Princess Chiquilla, daughter of the late Lone Star state, chief of the Cheyennes, attended a reception not long ago attired in the native costume of her rank. The Princess is a Carlisle graduate and an unusually bright and interesting young woman, quick to think and to speak. Her costume was rather conspicuous, and presently it became the subject of conversation among the little party about her.

"Do you wear it on the streets of New York, Princess?" inquired a man. "Not now," she replied. "I did when I first came East, but the people laughed at me so I changed it to your native style. I laughed, too, at the hats your women wore, and I thought how delighted our wild chiefs would be if they could have head-dresses like those."—Philadelphia Ledger.

Boodlers Have Nerve.

Jefferson City, Mo., Oct. 13.—Briefs were filed in the supreme court this afternoon in the appeal case of Col. Butler, for bribery of the St. Louis board of health. It terms with invectives against folk, and reads: "For conceit, impudence and mendacity, neither history nor fiction exhibits folk's peer or parallel."

Santo Domingo has appointed an arbitrator in the case of M. Sala, the Frenchman, who lent money and supplied munitions of war aggregating \$215,000.

The Sheriff Picked Him Up.

An information was yesterday filed by District Attorney Hart, charging E. C. Parsons, until recently an employe of the insane asylum, with stealing supplies from the state. As Parsons was not under arrest, a bench warrant was issued by Judge Burnett, and placed in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Skipton. Sheriff Colbath was in Portland last evening, and, being notified of the existence of the bench warrant, kept his eyes open, and at the Union depot, in Portland, ran on to his man, who, armed with a heavy grip, was awaiting the departure of the Northern Pacific train. Mr. Colbath promptly arrested him, and checked him over the Southern Pacific to Salem. When the sheriff arrived here with his man, court not being in session, the prisoner was placed in the county jail, and there he will remain until he appears in court tomorrow.

Brought to the Asylum.

Alvin Eastman, aged 21 years, residing at North Yamhill, was today brought to the insane asylum by J. W. Henry and Frank Gaunt, of McMinnville. The young man is suicidal in his tendencies, and seems to be insane on the subject of religion.

Will Lettuce Prevent Smallpox?

Lettuce is an absolute preventive of smallpox. No one is in the least particle of danger of catching smallpox who eats a little lettuce every day. Smallpox belongs to the scorbutic class of diseases. Sailors at sea, deprived of fresh vegetables, get scurvy. Scurvy is a typical scorbutic disease. Smallpox is another. Smallpox always rages during the winter season, when the poor people are deprived of fresh vegetable food. Celery and onions are good for this purpose, but there is such a long interval between their being gathered and eaten that they lose most of their anti-scorbutic properties. Lettuce is served shortly after it is picked, and hence contains the valuable properties which will pre-

vent smallpox. We say, without least hesitation or reserve, that lettuce will prevent smallpox. It has no liabilities, like vaccination, to produce other diseases. We are willing to stake our professional reputation on the broad statement that any one who eats lettuce daily will not catch smallpox, whether he is vaccinated or not.—Medical Talk.
