THE SEMI-MATINEE.

Theaters where the curtain rises at 6:45 sharp are a novelty, but will be introduced at Salem this week.

This semi-matinee is due to the necessity for large and expensive road companies not to miss a day on the road.

Plays that are carried by companies playing at cities like Portland and Sacramento cannot afford to lose a night for the sake of stopping at Salem.

So to make Salem at all, the way trains run, they must get off the same night, and if they put on the full play must start early.

When the theatre-goer gets this clearly through his or her head, he or she will see or should see, that having good plays of this kind at Salem depends on giving their patronage to the early play at 6:45.

It will be a novelty to get out of a theater before 10 o'clock, but it will be a whole-some novelty, as compared to staying up until midnight to see no better plays.

Will Salem people care enough for good plays to get into their seats at the Grand Opera house at a quarter to seven?

A COMPLETE REPUTATION.

The reply and exposure of the unfairness of the state board of health by John H. Albert, of Salem, is complete and he deserves credit for his public spirit in defending the good name of the city.

His review of the matter printed in this paper proves that Dr. Woods Hutchinson has been guilty of suppressing the facts found by his own board in order to throw mud at Salem.

He is, what this paper suspected from the first, entirely unfit for the responsible position to which the member of the board elected him, and should be removed from the office of secretary.

That Mr. Albert should take of his time and means and ability to defend

the good name of this city speaks highly of his public spirit and enterprise as a citizen.

Some will say Mr. Albert does these things to advertise himself, but it would be a good thing for our city if we had fifty men of his means and disposition to fight for Salem.

NEW TYPHOID THEORY.

Dr. Koch, the German bacteriologist has recently come out more strongly with his new theory regarding the propagation of typhoid fever. Briefly he declares in so many words that the purity of the milk and water supplies are matters of secondary importance in typhoid epidemics and that the disease is communicated chiefly by the contact of healthy persons with those suffering from the disease. He believes, of course, that the milk and water supplies should be safeguarded, but he does not attach to them the importance that physicians in this country attach to them.

The Revue Scientifique reports some of Dr. Koch's investigations in Treves. There were seventy-two cases of typhoid in the city, of which fifty-three cases were among children. All of the latter cases were attributed to association among children at school and to visits to sick persons, for the reason that the water supply of the place is pure. Heretofore Treves has never been free from typhoid but Dr. Koch claims he was able to wipe it out completely after three months, and now, six months later, not another case has appeared. The report continues:

"This was accomplished by isolating the typhoid patients in the same manner as though they were suffering from a virulent contagious disease. Experimental laboratories have been established at other places where typhoid is frequent, and the progress made is the eradication of the disease by isolation of the patients has, so far as it has gone, confirmed Dr. Koch's opinion that the purification of water and food supply is not a sufficient prevention against the spread of the disease."

INTELLIGENT ROAD MAKING.

The road from the city south is probably the best road in the county or in Western Oregon. There are some pieces of old-style road building and some of the more up to date. Through the old part of South Salem the road is flat, holds rain, has no drainage, and is all that a bad road can be.

The rise toward the old Leslie Methodist church has natural drainage, but needs to be rounded up and finished with some fine gravel or broken rock.

From the top of the hill to the cemetery hill it is a pretty fair gravel road, but needs badly to be gone over and improved on the surface, to let the water off low places and fill a few holes.

When the broken rock road begins, the heavy travel has worn that smooth as a cement pavement. There are no holes in it and it seems to improve with wear.

Ten road to Liberty is a model of what can be done with modern road machinery and broken rock, and reflects great credit on the Marion county court and the farmers of Liberty who built it.

It is as smooth for a bicycle as it is for any vehicle and does away with the need for any bicycle paths.

Intelligent road building should not stop there, but there should be intelligent care of the road after it is built.

Supplies of material for repairs should be distributed along the roads at convenient points, and a competent man should go over the roads after they are properly built and keep them in order.

The old plan was to haul a wagon load of gravel and dump it in a hole and leave it. The gravel costs about \$1.50 a load.

One load of gravel with a man to make the repairs would cost \$3, and would result in keeping several miles of road in repair, while \$3 worth of gravel without any repair work would fill only two holes.

Have we not advanced to the point of intelligence where we can see that it pays to keep our streets and roads clean and in repair?

If we have not we had better begin to teach this subject in the public schools, for we certainly lack intelligence in not caring for our roads and streets better than we do.

CONVICT LABOR ON ROADS.

It has been an oft made suggestion that the convict labor of our state be used for some purpose not conflicting with free labor. And it is right that this should be the governing view. The aim of penology is to reform. The healthy, busy body keeps the mind right. But no legitimate enterprise paying fair wages can compete with cheap convict labor. The convict does as little as he can, and his labor is but a fraction as valuable as that of the free man, yet the state

prison is always the manufacturer's hard competitor. The use of convict labor on the highways should be brought about. An improvement of roads might occur through the agency of convict labor, at any rate in the vicinity of the penitentiaries. The scheme is worth trying. The roads must be improved. Free labor is not solicitous of this work. Gangs could be used in the regions having secure places of detention. The convicts must labor, if prison health and prison discipline are to be maintained. And this might be a good solution of the whole problem.

SMITH ON POLLUTION.

Andrew C. Smith, of Portland, was defeated for president of the senate, and fell down egregiously in his effort to spring Harvey Scott as United States senator.

His performances as president of the state board of health, to which Governor Chamberlain felt obliged to appoint him, because Smith had lobbied the bill through, are bringing the whole board into contempt.

His excuse for not being able to show fever germs in the Salem water supply is this: "At this time, after heavy rains, the manifestations of typhus are not as plain as they have been. The polluted areas have been washed off, and the difficulty of bacteriological examinations is thereby increased."

According to this, the fever germs, if they ever existed, came not from the water, but "from polluted areas."

What shall be done with such hotch-potch in the name of science? Is Salem to be exposed to more of this sort of half-baked nonsense?

Why don't Smith and his gang of pollution experts dry up, and when they can find some good thing to say about Oregon's health and climate, say it, and go about their business?

What is the use of parading before the world a lot of theoretical pollution that won't bear investigation? Oregon needs good affirmative work by its state and local boards of health.

It does not need pollution in print sown broadcast.

The state board of health should do its dirty work quietly, as gentlemen should, and not cry pollution from the housetops. All honor to the physician who quietly brings about good sanitary conditions in a state institution or community, but to hell with the brass band pollutionists.
