Ellery's Royal Italian Band, which
has been at the Grand Opera house
for a five weeks' engagement in San
Francisco, which was out of the ordi-
nary in at least one respect. The
band had intended playing a two
weeks' engagement in that city, and
was booked accordingly. The busi-
ness for the two weeks was so pro-
fitable, owing to the great enthusiasm
the band created, that the engage-
ment was lengthened out one more
week, by canceling time in several
smaller cities. The people, it seems,
could not have their appetites for
fine music satisfied in three weeks,
and the engagement was finally
lengthened again, making in all five
weeks' stay, which might easily have
been prolonged that much longer to a
profitable business, but the pavilion
in which the band was playing had
previously been leased for other pur-
poses, and the band was literally
out of a place where large financial
returns were certain. The entire
bookings of the band had to be
changed, owing to the extension of the
San Francisco engagement, but that
was accomplished without a great
deal of trouble, as theater managers
everywhere are always willing to
make a way for anything which they
know to be the best of its kind. The
band's tour this season has been al-
most one long ovation, so enthusias-
tic have the music-lovers become.
Those who have heard it this season
declare that its playing completely
eclipses the fine work it did in the
past two seasons, and that Director
Haffarell "The Great," has no equal.
