HORSES SHAMEFULLY ABUSED.

While driving in Polk county the writer saw a case of shameful abuse of unfortunate horses hitched to a wood-hauler's wagon.

The fellow had on a very large load and a light, poorly-fed team. They had next to no flesh on their spare flanks.

He was literally whaling them up a long hill. They could pull the load about a rod at a time, and then had to stop from exhaustion.

Such a man is unfit to be entrusted with the care of horses, and should be fined or imprisoned until he can be brought to his senses.

People who buy fuel that is hauled in should look at the poor horses that draw it to them, and they would of ten see that they were abused.

People who get cheap fuel often get it at the expense of underfed, overworked, abused and half-starved animals that do the hauling.

The fuel problem is being solved in part by burning coke from the gas works at \$5.00 a ton. It will burn finely in any range with a grate.

The coke may also have been produced by starvation and oppression of labor, but it is more than likely that it was not, as humans can speak.

GRAND WORK FOR SALEM.

At this season of the year we are glad to notice that the Portland papers speak well of the prune crop at Salem.

They have columns about the splendid prune output. They are prunes without flies on them; not even microbes.

The large-hearted, generous treatment of this city ought to meet with a cordial financial response from our people.

That the great, warm, generous throbbing, fair-minded heart of the Oregonian can unlimber so as to treat our prunes on equal terms with the

prunes of Turkey, is cause for rejoicing.

There is, so far, no doubt thrown on the character of our prunes. It is a subject that there has been no controversy about. The Oregonian can afford to be fair about prunes.

A WORD WITH THE STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

The state board of health doubtless is glad to hide behind a controversy between its secretary and a Salem property owner.

The question still remains, are the members of that board responsible or not responsible for the utterances of their secretary?

Is he their accredited agent or not? Not one of the board has had the fairness to discredit his statements, or dissent from his findings.

Not one of the board has had the courage or fairness to file a word of dissent from the slanders their secretary has put on this community.

Not one of them has protested, or filed a minority report of any kind, and they have, to date, all defended his actions, no matter how untrue or unjust.

Not one member of that board seems to "savvy" that an outrage has been committed, or has any red blood that is stirred by injustice done.

In law they affirm if they do not repudiate. In fact one member had the nerve to stand up before a body of Salem citizens and defend Woods Hutchinson.

After the utter and complete failure to prove anything that has been charged, a doctor will go so far as to say that even vegetables are dangerous that have been washed in Salem water.

At present there is not a known case of typhoid fever in the city. Still the fine sense of honor of the members of the state board will not permit them to say one word in repudiation of their executive official.

What town will Woods Hutchinson strike next? If he strikes, will not this state board back him, no matter how unfounded or outrageous his attack?

OREGON POLITICS IN 1904.

The election in 1904 will excite the cupidity of the spoils politician to a greater degree than ever before in our history.

In a presidential year the predatory elements of a party come to the surface, for it is then that the patronage for four years is disposed of.

The postoffices are raffled off to the workers, the consulships are promised far in advance of vacancies, and foreign ministers are created.

Places like ambassador to Turkey, minister to the Argentine, Japan and consul to Chefoo, Trieste and Top-

olobampo are promised in advance.

Heads of the state institutions are thrown into the lottery that makes up state and district conventions, and state and federal judgeships are allotted.

It is a mild statement to say that fifty to one hundred offices are amenable to the methods of the patronage dispenser, that are worth all the way from \$2000 to \$10,000 a year.

Then there are hundreds of smaller awards for the party crumb-pickers of the male sex, and not a few of the politically-inclined female.

There will be two elections in Oregon next year—one in June for congressmen, county and state officials, and one in November for Presidential electors.

The hold-over state senators will have a United-States senator to elect, who will succeed Senator John H. Mitchell.

Whether that gentleman will have a contest on his hands or whether he will succeed himself without opposition, as he did in 1892, remains to be seen.

1904 will be a history-making one in Oregon and in the nation, and every American who loves his country should be prepared to take his part in the coming campaigns.

Bryan Preaches.

Ruth Bryan married against her parents' wishes a short time ago, and the Commoner, Mr. Bryan's paper, of the 16th, contains a long editorial, which begins as follows:

"There is perhaps no more important lesson that young or old can learn than that evils are more easily resisted in the beginning than after they have been allowed to develop. Take, for instance, disobedience to parents. It usually begins in some small matter, when the child feels that the parent has required some unnecessary thing, or refused to permit something that the child desires to do. If it were in an important matter the child would shrink from disobedience, but it seems so small that the wish of the child triumphs over the will of the father or mother, and the act of disobedience becomes the precedent for others, until disobedience is easier than obedience.

"Disobedience usually leads to other offenses; untruthfulness, especially, is apt to follow in the wake of disobedience, being resorted to as a means of avoiding punishment, or even reproof.

"From disregard of parental authority it is an easy step to the disregard of the authority of government, and the disobedient child not unnaturally develops into the lawless citizen, until finally the downward course leads to the door of some institution established for correction and reform.

Disobedience to authority is more easily checked when it first begins to manifest itself than after the habit has grown strong by indulgence."

Expansion of Lane County.

The southern boundary of Lane county, as changed by the legislature last winter, adds about two townships to the southwest corner of our county, giving us six miles more of coast line, and practically another outlet to the sea. The territory includes the two beautiful lakes known as Woabink or Clear Lake and Tiltcoos or Ten Mile, with their adjacent settlements and the fertile valley of the Ten Mile, the line running just south of this valley, and through a portion of the latter lake. The postoffice

known as Alone is also now in Lane county, and three school districts which were formerly in our neighboring county on the south. The change, however, does not materially affect that location this year, as the remainder of the taxes for 1902 will be paid to Douglas apportioned by that county. The transcripts of the evidence of the title to real estate and the court records have arrived in this county, but, as the law does not in this case provide precincts, road districts and school districts, it is thought by county officials here that such districts will have to be re-established according to law in Lane county—Leader.

Leprosy in Colombia.

Professor Hutchinson, said to be a well-known expert on the subject of leprosy, has written a letter to the London Times in which he establishes that this loathsome disease is prevalent in Northern Colombia, where it was proposed to construct the Isthmian canal. The professors insist that "there is a connection between a diet of diseased fish and the dread malady.

He has been investigating the case and says that "it was in that region that the earliest Spanish settlements were made, and where, according to tradition, the first cases of leprosy on the American continent occurred. He quotes the figures of Dr. Ashmead of New York City to show that, while there are 200,000 leprosy in India, 100,000 in China and an equal number in Japan, there are 20,000 in Colombia.

This, allowing for the difference in population, shows that there are about twelve cases of leprosy in Colombia to one in India. As a matter of fact, he says the excess in Colombia is probably much greater. In India, where in vast districts fish is forbidden food, the ratio of leprosy is six per 10,000. In Colombia, where the consumption of fish is stimulated by religious ritual, the leprosy ratio is nearly seventy per 10,000.

A Machine That Flies.

San Francisco, Oct. 19.—Dr. August Greth, who, for a year past, has been unostentatiously working on an airship Sunday surprised the residents of San Francisco by sailing over their heads for two hours, directing his machine almost at will, and demonstrating that in many essentials he has solved the problem of aerial navigation.

Dr. Greth had previously tested his airship by making ascensions with the balloon held captive by a long rope, but today was the first time that he had gone skyward free. His ascensions were made from a lot almost in the heart of the city, and Dr. Greth attempted to encircle a towering newspaper building about a mile eastward, but found the high currents too strong for his power, and then turned in an opposite direction.

The currents threatened to take him over the Pacific, and he determined to make a landing on the parade ground of the Presidio military reservation, but made the mistake of letting out too much gas, and he landed in the bay about 200 feet from shore.

A crew of the lifesaving station rescued him and his flying machine, which sustained very little damage by the unfortunate termination of the voyage.

Agricultural Experts.

Products of agriculture have always formed the largest share of our exports. In 1880 they formed 85 per cent of the total exports, and manufacturers formed but 12 per cent of the total. In 1890 agricultural products formed but 61 per cent of the total, while manufacturers had so increased that they formed 31 per cent of the total. The exportation of agricultural products has increased less than 40 per cent since 1880, while that of manufacturers has increased 300 per cent in that time.
