

SOME THOUGHTS ON ART

Very Pertinent Suggestions Made by an Art Lover

Of Inestimable Value in Shaping Minds of the Young, and in Creating Love for Beautiful

Editor Journal: With very great interest I listened Wednesday night at the east school to Mr. Hofer and to Miss Calbraith. The sum-total of their remarks I fully endorse; that no effort ought to be spared to develop in every way the love of art in the rising generation, and a very excellent plan it would be to place before their eyes continually, in their homes if possible, or in the public schools where so many of their young days are spent. Specimens of pure art—good productions, like the ones that were shown to us. But in connection with this, would it not be a good plan to have from time to time, readings (on the great masters and their works,) for young and old?

In this day of sham and of mockery of all that is true and elevating, it is refreshing to go back and study the life of Michael Angelo. No feather-bed warrior was he! Telling early and late in the pursuit of his beloved art. When working on one of his magnificent ceilings, he wrapped his cloak around him and slept on the scaffolding in order to lose no time going backwards and forwards to his lodgings.

Michael Angelo, Raphael, Rembrandt (of course there were others, I just remember these) were to painting, what Bach, Haydn and Beethoven were to music. These sturdy pioneers sought for truth and beauty, for them the terms were synonymous, as the miner seeks for gold. Indeed the fundamental principle of art is the truth. Let me quote from Newell, Dwight Hillis.

"Linger long in the cities of Italy. Ruskin found some temples in the full pride of their strength and the perfection of their beauty, having passed unharmed through the snows of a thousand winters and the storms of a thousand summers. But other temples he found that were mere shells of their former loveliness, bare skeletons of pierced walls, here a tower and there an arch. Studying the deserted temples through which the sea-wind moaned and murmured, and the ruins that time was plowing into dust, he discovered that no robber hand had wrought this ruin, that no fire had consumed the arch or overthrown the column. In Venice the roof of the great church had fallen because the architect had put lying stones in the foundation. In Verona the people had deserted the cathedral because the architect had built columns of plaster and painted them to look like veined marble, forgetting that time would soon expose the ugly, naked lie. One day entering a church in a heavy rain storm, he found buckets placed to catch the rain that was dripping from the priceless frescoes of Tintoretto, because a builder had put lying tiles upon the roof. He saw ships cast upon the rocks because some smith had put a lying link in the anchor's cable." "If untruth is fatal to the permanency of buildings, much more is it fatal to excellence in the soul. For man the beginning of lies is ruin, and the end thereof death. Therefore in John's vision of the city of God, he saw there no sorcerer, no murderer, and no man 'who loveth and maketh a lie.' For life's deadliest enemy, and its most despicable one, is falsehood."

It is not as accomplishments that I would advocate the intelligent knowledge and understanding of the fine arts for the young, but as helps to building character. Now let me quote Ruskin in "Modern Painters," Vol III, p. 459 he writes: "The whole period of youth is one essentially of formation, education, instruction—I use

Scranton, Pa., Oct. 23.—Operations were suspended at every colliery in this section this morning, to resume November 4th. Sixty thousand are idle.

INDICTMENTS FOUND.

Miss Ware, Horace McKinley and S. D. Puter Have 20 Counts to Face.

Indictments charging them with forgery and conspiracy in a scheme to defraud the government out of land, were returned yesterday by the federal grand jury against ex-United States Commissioner Miss Marie L. Ware, Horace G. McKinley and S. A. D. Puter. Other indictments growing out of the land fraud investigations are expected to day. It is understood that one more charge is sure to be made. This person is supposed to be John Doe, in the case about the identity of whom there has been considerable speculation. The indictments against the trio from Eugene were not formally returned into court yesterday, but when the jury appeared to hand in another indictment, it was announced that these three matters were ready for return, and the judge ordered them sent in. As soon as this is done the defendants will be re-arrested and placed under new bonds for appearance at trial. It is expected that the new bonds will be in the sum of \$5000 each, instead of \$2000, as at present. The final trial of the cases will probably be had during November or December.

It was hardly expected, either by the parties directly concerned, or others, that the indictments would be returned against Miss Ware and her associates in the land frauds yesterday. As a consequence, the action of the jury was a complete surprise to them. The indicted parties accept the situation with the air of those submitting to the inevitable, but it is their expressed intention to fight the cases through the court to the end in an endeavor to clear themselves from the accusations.

Murderer Left-Handed.

London, Oct. 23.—The inquest on Sagouni, the Armenian leader, who was murdered yesterday, was opened today. It developed that the shots were fired by a left-handed man. There are no other clues, and no arrests.

KLAMATH STOCK INDUSTRY.

A Great Increase in Its Volume During the Past Few Years, But Is Yet in Its Infancy.

The herds of cattle belonging to J. W. Howard, the Silver Lake stockman, are now nearly all in the valley. A band of 1200 head arrived at the Cantrall-Ankeny ranch last week, and 1000 head are en route via Klamath Marsh. In all Mr. Howard will feed and fatten for market in Klamath valley this fall and winter 2700 head. They will be shipped out in 400 and 500 lots, as often as that many are ready for market, and he expects to feed on his hay and ship the last bunch by January 15th. He will commence by feeding 45 tons of alfalfa per day. The present estimated value of the hay is \$16 per ton, making an expenditure of \$450 per day, or \$14.50 for each hour of the 24. This is Mr. Howard's third season in Klamath county, and at the end of the year he will have left in the neighbor-

hood of \$30,000 in the valley. His cattle last year were among the highest grade put on the market, and the knowledge of his having fattened them in this valley has brought other stockmen here this fall. There is 20 per cent more hay raised in the county this year than any previous year, but the prices are highest and demand for it the greatest in 14 years. Hay is now selling at \$13 and \$14 in Tule Lake valley.

The stock industry in Klamath county has proven a great success. Of its continuance and its increase in volume there is no question. A very few years ago not to exceed 500 head of cattle could be wintered in Klamath valley, including the Merrill country, and now it will support nearly 20,000. The industry is yet in its infancy, only in the crude outline of what it may become. There is no shelter for stock to protect them from winter storms. The soil is not cultivated so as to produce what it should.

But it takes capital, time, expense, etc., to bring about these conditions. Nearly \$450,000 worth of cattle are shipped to market from the county this fall. Of these, J. W. Howard has \$100,000 worth, Gerber Bros. \$100,000, Mitchell Bros. \$100,000, and the other dealers will make up the balance. Klamath Express.

Rabbit Drive in Gilliam.

The people of Eight-Mile, a valley 12 miles south of Arlington, will have a big rabbit drive November 8th, the drive beginning at 11 a. m. The rabbits of that section have become numerous that they have destroyed the crops. The farmers and sheepmen have decided that the only way to have either wheat or pasture is to destroy the rabbits. It is expected that at least 2500 will be captured. The majority of the catch will go to the Portland market or the Echo Canning Company.
