ALL FOR SPECIAL SESSION.

The Oregonian, big dog, little dog,
and old dog Tray are all bellowing for
a special session.

The spigot of taxation is in danger
of ceasing to flow, and that would ruin
the political industry.

The failure to make any assessment
ought to be hailed with joy, but for
the harvest of the warrant speculators
that would surely follow.

When a special session was wanted
to cut off the unconstitutional fees
and perquisites of state officials all op-
posed a special session of the legisla-
ture.

Big dog, little dog, and all the political
tail-waggers protested when it
was proposed to cut off grafts, in viola-
tion of the hoary old state constitu-
tion.

But this is different. A special ses-
sion to keep the faucet flowing,
to keep open wide bung and spigot, and
all the patent syphons and other
sucking-pump devices.

A COMPLETE BUSINESS PROGRAM

At the coming city election it is not
likely that there will be any aldermen
elected who will depart from the fixed
business policy of this city.

The city must be run on an abso-
lutely cash basis. No floating debt.
That policy is well-established in
the now charter, and cannot be de-
parted from, if there were any alder-
men who wished to do so.

The council must estimate in ad-
vance its revenues for 1904, and then
formulate a budget of appropriations
for each department for the year.

All officials have fixed salaries, and
all fees go into the treasury.
Aldermen cannot exceed those ap-
propriations, without becoming per-
sonally liable for the excess. There is
no way to plunge the city in debt, but
by a direct vote of the people.

Aldermen must be free-holders, and
must have resided in the ward three
years.

All bonded debt of the city must be

funded on the popular loan plan. The
\$30,000 being carried temporarily by a
Salem bank must be voted on at the
coming city election.

That vote will be to authorize a pop-
ular loan at the lowest rate of interest
at the time prevailing for such secur-
ities.

The popular loan must be open to
every citizen on equal terms, to sub-
scribe for a large or small amount at
par for the bonds. The bonds, by
common consent, are not taxable.

The smallest subscribers must be
served first when the recorder issues
the bonds. There can be no monopoly
by large financial concerns.

Three popular loans have been sub-
scribed for in the past in sums
amounting to hundreds of thousands
of dollars, and the next loan will go
in the same way, and be taken several
times over.

There should be added to this busi-
ness program the right of the people
to make nominations by direct vote at
the primaries. Then it would be the
most perfect plan of a city govern-
ment in existence.

INDICTING BROTHER SCOTT.

The Eugene Register calls H. W.
Scott, of the Oregonian, the destroying
angel of the Republican party.

It intimates that the door-posts of
none of the Oregon delegation are
sprinkled with blood, and none of
them will be passed over.

The fulminations of the forest re-
serve fraud publications from the Ore-
gonian bureau, it says, are aimed at
Mitchell, Fulton, Williamson and Her-
mann.

The Register is the best exponent
of the present delegation in Lane county,
and its utterances are not without in-
terest.

"Political itch is the ruin of many
a good man, and very often the de-
stroyer of party harmony."

"The frequent efforts at concilia-
tion of Republican factions in Oregon
have always succeeded up to a certain
point, and then smashed into kindling
wood by some disappointed office-seek-
ers, who failed to land the place."

"If leaders thought more of party
principle than of personal preferment
and glory, the Republican party in
Oregon today would be harmonious,
bitter personal animosities would be
eliminated, and the victor and van-
quished of all the state and district
conventions would work shoulder to
shoulder for success of the party, in-
stead of inaugurating a tug-of-war."

"It is barely possible that, with more
congenial party relations, the second
stroke of senatorial lightning might
be successful in landing on a certain
editorial desk in Portland. Present
conditions, however, do not indicate
the remotest possibility of such an
occurrence, and conditions will re-
main the same unless there is a
change in Portland political journal-
ism."

In other words, if you will be good,
and come into the circle, and behave
long enough to let us shape things, we
will make you a senator.

But can any syndicate make Mr.
Scott senator? Would not Mr. Scott
be just as much a "destroying angel"
of peace and harmony in the senate
as he is in the Republican party of
Oregon?

There are some who think better of
Mr. Scott than that all his publications
on the timber land frauds are dictated
by personal motives to down some
man that he may succeed to political
office.

Election Tomorrow.

Elections will be held in eleven
states tomorrow. In most of them the
campaigns have not awakened great
interest, but the results will be closely
watched, as indicating what the trend
of public sentiment may be one year
before the great national election of
1904. Full state tickets are to be
elected in Massachusetts, Rhode
Island, Maryland, Ohio, Kentucky,
Iowa and Mississippi, while in New
York, Pennsylvania and Colorado
judges and several minor offices are
to be voted for. The contests are be-
tween candidates of the two old par-
ties, although the prohibitionists have
tickets in all the states except Colo-
rado. The Socialists in all except Ne-
braska and Colorado, the Populists in
Iowa and Colorado, and the Socialist
Labor Party in New York, Massachu-
setts and Ohio. The most interesting
campaigns have been made in Mary-
land, Ohio and Kentucky, while the
municipal contest in New York has
been closely watched by people in all
parts of the country. The result in
Maryland is important as bearing on
the fortunes of Senator Gorman, who
is an avowed candidate for President.
For the same reason, the election in
Ohio will also be significant, as tend-
ing to show what local support will be
given to the Democratic candidate
for Governor, Tom Johnson, who is
also supposed to be in a receptive
mood in the matter of the presidency.
Governor Beckham is a candidate for
re-election in Kentucky, and, as the

state has been close in recent years,
the vote may indicate what the result
will be in the presidential election
next year. As for the states where
minor state officers are to be chosen,
it is probable that local issues will
govern and thus make it impossible to
draw conclusions as to the probable
results next year.

VACANCIES IN LEGISLATURE.

Special Elections Necessary if Ses-
sion Is Called.

A. W. Prescott's Salem special. Not
only will a special session of the leg-
islature be necessary to cure the de-
fect in the taxation law, but a special
election will be necessary to fill sev-
eral vacancies in the legislature. The
vacancies must be filled before the ses-
sion is held, according to the language
of the constitution, which says:

"Where any vacancies shall happen
in the office of member of the senate
or house of representatives by death,
resignation or otherwise, and a session
of the legislature is to take place be-
fore the next biennial election, the gov-
ernor shall issue a writ of election
directing the sheriff of the county, or
sheriffs of the counties composing the
district in which such vacancies shall
occur, commanding him or them to
notify the several judges of election
in his county or their districts to hold
a special election fill such vacancy or
vacancies, at a time appointed by the
governor."

There are now at least three vacan-
cies, those being the offices of Senator
Fulton, of Clatsop; Senator Daly, of
Benton, and Senator Williamson, of
Wasco, Crook, Klamath and Lake.
These members of the senate have ac-
cepted other lucrative offices, and
thereby their seats in the senate be-
came vacant. It is also generally un-
derstood that Senator Mulkey has re-
moved from Polk county and Repre-
sentative Davey has removed from
Marion, though this is a matter not
definitely known, and it is not certain
that their seats in the legislature are
vacant. All these counties are en-
titled to full representation, and it
would seem that if a special session
shall be called, the date must be set
late enough to permit of a special elec-
tion beforehand.

It is possible that the constitutional
provision requiring that a special elec-
tion be held to fill a vacancy, if a ses-
sion of the legislature will occur be-
fore the biennial election, does not
apply to special sessions, but there is
nothing in the language of the constitu-
tion to indicate that an exception
was intended. Ten days' notice of the
election must be given by the clerks,
and it will take five days to get the
notice from the governor to the sheriffs.

Time must also be given for the
nomination of candidates. Those who
have estimated the time that will be
required to fill the vacancies, are of
the opinion that the legislature can-
not be convened earlier than the 10th
of December.

REFERENDUM COMPLICATION

Supreme Court Decision Raises An-
other Question.

Salem special: What effect the in-
itiative and referendum amendment
will have on a law to be passed at a
special session of the legislature,
should one be called, is a question that
has been raised since the supreme
court rendered its decision in the tax
case.

The referendum clause provides that
laws shall not go into effect until 90
days after adjournment of the legisla-
ture, unless it is necessary for the
preservation of the public health,
peace or safety that they take im-
mediate effect. The question now is
whether a remedial tax law would be
necessary for the immediate preserva-
tion of the public peace or safety, or
whether the legislature's declaration
upon that point is conclusive. A case
is now pending in the supreme court,
involving these questions, and also the
validity of the amendment itself.

If a remedial act can not be put into
force and effect at once by means of
an emergency clause, then a special
session will do no good, for, after the
January terms of court have been held
it will be too late to make the tax
levy. The referendum case has not
yet been argued in the supreme court,
nor even set for trial, so that it can-
not be predicted how soon a decision
may be reached.

The supreme court left today for
Pendleton to hold a term of court
there, and will be gone about a week.
In the ordinary course of business it
would seem that a decision in the re-
ferendum case could not be had in less
than a month. In view of the complica-
tion in the tax law, the decision in
the referendum case assumes added
importance.

One Editor's Heart in the Right Place.

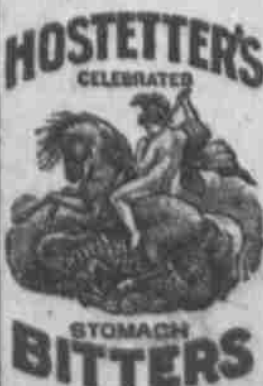
(Yakima Bay News, October 29.)
