PURDUE WRECK CRIMINAL

Coroner Criticises the Officers Of The Big Four

Traid Was Running Thirty Miles an Hour When the Law Permits Only Four

Indianapolis, Nov. 6.—The coroner at noon, after hearing more evidence in the fatal Purdue wreck, forecasted the verdict, by criticizing the "Big Four" officials. He said the engineer was not altogether to blame, as the superintendent allowed only five minutes to go two miles through the heart of the city, where the law only allows a four-mile speed.

The Boiler Exploded. Columbus, O., Nov. 6.—The boiler of a portable engine at the state university farm exploded this morning. Engineer Pepper was blown 100 feet and killed, and his assistant, Kilgardner, fatally scalded.

Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 6.—The state rested its case in the Farris bribery trial this morning. Judge Graves' instructions to the jury were pointed. The minimum punishment, if found guilty, is two years, and the maximum seven.

Arbitration Is a Farce

Berlin, Nov. 6.—German newspapers favor the withdrawal of Germany's Venezuelan claim from The Hague tribunal. The Zeitung today says arbitration is a farce, that President Muryavieff, of The Hague, shows anti-German bias, and insulted the German representative, also the Belgian and French representatives.

PARKS GETS HIS SENTENCE

Goes to Sing Sing For Two Years and a Half
