

NO MORE PUBLIC-ATIONS

From Dr. Woods Hutchison are Wanted at Salem

His Amplified Rot Should be Treated With the Silent Contempt It Deserves.

Salem people and business men generally are tired of publications emanating from the state board of health through the pen of Dr. Woods Hutchison.

Dr. Hutchison has never proven a proposition he has made, and the people realize that their town has been treated most unfairly, and no member of that board has offered to undo the wrong done this community.

Now the voluble official head of the state board of health has supplied the city board of health with a voluminous report, in which the state board has formulated its late conclusions upon the city and well water used in Salem. The documents will be placed before the city board at a meeting to be called at an early date, to consider its communication.

The analyses of the water and the data compiled by the state board of health regarding the water supply of Salem were asked for by City Recorder Judah, secretary of the city health board, about a month ago, in order to have the same on file.

There is a growing disposition to treat with silent contempt any further communications that the state board may make through its authorized mouthpiece. Such discussions and advertisements can only harm, and it will be time enough when the state board can rectify its wrongs, and tell the truth and say good things to spread them before the public. To the credit of the local health board

they have given to the public only good statements, and it is to be hoped that no official notice will be taken of Hutchison's latest, and that there will be no further controversy over an incident that is closed by the absolute failure of the accusations. The Journal has no further space to give the matter.

Loyal to United States.
Washington, Nov. 13.—In his annual report on the condition of affairs in the Island of Porto Rico, made public Thursday, Governor Hunt says the situation is one of hope, and there is improvement, with a strong current in favor of Americanism. Many people, he says, think the present form of government can be preserved for some time, the natives feeling that it is liable in its extension to result in political autonomy, and be general in its financial benefits.

Governor Hunt's report shows material growth in the commerce of the island, the local exports for 1903 being \$14,866,000, as against \$12,309,000 for the preceding fiscal year. The report discloses the significant fact that, for the first time since American sovereignty, the balance of trade is in favor of Porto Rico. In closing, Governor Hunt says the result proves the wisdom of congress in conferring civil government on the people. In any situation that may arise, the people, he says, will be found loyal to the United States.

Sudden Death of Medford Girl.
Missoula, Mont., Nov. 13.—Miss Sarah Knowles, of Medford, Oregon, aged 20 years, died while en route to her home from Lincoln, Neb., of heart failure, in the Northern Pacific Pullman car at Bonita, a small station 24 miles east of Missoula. She was sick when she left Lincoln.

The girl's parents live at Jacksonville, Or., and three married sisters reside at Medford, Or. The body was shipped West last night.

Sultan Talks Prettily.
Constantinople, Nov. 13.—The Russian and Austrian ambassadors have been notified that the sultan is preparing a satisfactory reply to their demands.

Millionaire Dead.
Cincinnati, Nov. 13.—Alfred Redway, the millionaire stove manufacturer, died this morning.
