HOP MARKET RECOVERS

New York Market Showing up a Little Firmer

Bing's Latest Report Shows That There Is An Upward Tendency In Prices

In spite of bearish reports at Salem, Eastern advices indicate firmer figures. Albert Bing writes The Journal, from St. Louis, November 8th, to this effect:
"Nothing new in the hop market. On strong export demand the market is recovering, and high prices prevail."

The Waterville, (N. Y.) Times, in its issue of last Friday, says of the hop market in that section:

"There has been a good deal of buying during the past week at prices ranging from 25c to 30 1/2c. The largest lot sold was that of George W. Allen, consisting of 142 bales. The price was not given out. Henry Shoemaker sold 81 bales for 30 1/2c, M. Travis 14 at 27c, C. I. Pock 40 at 28 1/2c, Peter Foley 20 at 28c, Henry Beecher 18 bales at 30c, Thomas Bogan 23 at 27 1/2c, Ira Hills 32 at 25c, Michael Lawless 25 at 27c, Wm. Condon 9 at 29c. These are about the state of the market at present."

The New York Journal and Bulletin, of the same date, gives the following resume of the hop market:

"The advices received from the coast reported the markets holding firm for choice selections; in fact growers in many instances were reported as holding for a higher basis of values, and as buyers were not willing to advance their bids business was reported quiet. Low-grade hops continued to receive only indifferent attention from buyers. California advices reported a large clearance of hops from that state. Reports from up the state reported the markets holding firm, especially for choice grades, the recent buying for export having a strengthening influence; no trade of importance, however, was reported for the day. Locally the market held firm. New business was reported quiet, but there was a moderate movement of hops into brewers' hands, in the way of deliveries on outstanding contracts."

The Goods Returned

J. G. Anderson, of North Salem, who recently moved here from Mill City, a few days ago found that his house had been robbed, and he placed the matter in the hands of Chief of Police Gibson. Mr. Anderson's loss consisted of wearing apparel belonging to his wife, to the value of about \$50, and he suspected a young woman and her father, who recently stopped at the Anderson home. Chief Gibson traced the suspects to Portland, located them and wrote them to return the stolen articles, or they would be arrested, and last evening the stolen goods came up by express, charges prepaid.

Mr. Anderson, in telling his story, stated that Sylvester Packenpaugh and daughter, Opal, roomed at his house for a few days, leaving on November 5th. They had formerly lived at Mill City, and later at Salt Lake. On leaving here they planned to go to Portland for the winter. Immediately after they left the loss of some of Mrs. Anderson's clothing, some of it fine needlework, was discovered, and, suspecting his erstwhile guests, Mr. Anderson placed the matter in the hands of the police.

The return of the goods pleased Mr. Anderson very much, though he claims that some of the articles are still missing, and, though he agreed not to prosecute Packenpaugh and his daughter.
