CRISIS IN THE STRIKE

Scab Teamsters Fire On Those Who Try to Stop Them

Company Detectives Armed With Revolvers Pursue the Fleeing Pickets of the Strikers.

Chicago, Nov. 17.—A crisis in the strike is on today. Union pickets this morning attempted to intercept a wagon load of supplies and bedding, which the company agents were endeavoring to land at the barns, and were fired upon by the wagon drivers. A number of company detectives, following the wagons in carriages, whipped out revolvers and joined in the chase. The pickets fled, presumably uninjured, and the police were again augmented. Thirteen hundred, more than five-eighths of the entire force, are guarding the company's lines. A thousand of these are on the Cottage Grove line, where five cars were sent out this morning.

A shot was fired at a Wentworth-avenue car this morning from an alleyway. The police failed to capture the offender. A big bar of pig lead was thrown through another car, and crushed a policeman's helmet, but did not seriously injure him.

A trip was made without incident, four trains following the mail car; at the same time 25 Wentworth-avenue cars are being run, and street railway officials declare that when police protection is given, service on the other lines would be resumed. Sympathizing teamsters were out in large numbers, and made many attempts at blockade, but the police in all cases were quick to arrest the drivers.

The mayor today appointed an arbitration board, and wrote the street car officials, asking them to meet, in hopes they could induce arbitration.

All Quiet at Panama

Washington, Nov. 17.—Consul Gudge, of Panama, cables the state department today that all officials of the former department of Panama are now supporting the republic, and the sentiment is unanimous that life and property will be fully protected. The commissioner from Colombia has arrived at Colon, where he will be met by the Panama commissioners.

Talking Business

Washington, Nov. 17.—Dietrich was here in a long conference with Attorney Knox today regarding his indictment. The senator has not yet been arrested, but a deputy is expected from Omaha.

Two Pair Kings up

London, Nov. 17.—The king and queen of Italy arrived at Windsor castle this afternoon, where they were warmly received by Edward and Alexandra.

Butchers Have Won

Cincinnati, Nov. 17.—Two-thirds of the butchers have won their points and returned to work today. Fifteen packing plants were opened and 10 others still remain idle.

The final account of George Palmer, administrator of the estate of Thomas Palmer, deceased, was filed in the county court this morning, and the date for hearing was set for December 19th, at 10 a. m.

The final account of J. H. Riches, administrator of the estate of C. H. Mulkey, deceased, was also filed, and the same date and hour set for hearing the account.
