

# PLUCKY YOUNG WOMAN

## She Makes Determined Fight For An Al-aska Mine

### Alleges Alaskan Courts Were Corrupt to Rottenness and a Scandal Is Due

Charges of wholesale corruption and fraud are to be made by Miss Lena S. Walton to Attorney General Knox against men who have been government officials in the Cape Nome district of Alaska, and a strong attempt will be made to secure a government investigation of the administration of justice and mining affairs in the frozen north. Miss Walton is the intrepid young woman who in four years has made a fortune by daring mining ventures in the goldfields of Nome and who is now in this city preparing to take her suit against

Millionaire Charles D. Lane for the possession of claim 19 near Nome to the supreme court.

In speaking of the matter Miss Walton said: "I will start East next week with my attorneys to lay before the department of justice the evidence I have secured showing a shameful state of affairs in the vicinity of the Cape Nome district. In my suit against Lane I have ample proof to show that crooked work has been done at Nome and I believe some of the parties connected with it can be sent to prison for their participation. My prime object, of course, is to reopen the case, and after my evidence has been submitted I think we will have no trouble in doing so."

"We propose to prove that W. H. Ferguson, formerly United States commissioner at Council City, deliberately withheld the old records of the district and put them out of the way in the interests of Lane. We will also show and prove by the affidavits of court officials that the transcript of the case was altogether changed by the assistance of men in power between the time it left the court of Judge Wickersham at Nome and the time that it arrived in this city to go before the United States circuit court of appeals in this city. Portions of the record were deliberately made away with and other portions of documents on file were changed."

"We will show that money was allowed to go into the jury room in a box of collars while the case was on trial at Nome and that members of the jury were made drunk. We also have affidavits to prove that three of the jurors voted straight through the case against Lane and that when the poll was taken they were allowed to pass without making answer when questioned for their verdict. All of this and open bribery, which we have affidavits to prove, was used with the connivance of officials, and we propose to secure through Attorney General Knox a government investigation of the whole affair. While the entire facts cannot yet be made public we believe that the complete proofs we will exhibit will create the biggest scandal that has yet come out of Alaska."

In securing affidavits which she claims will prove her statements Miss Walton has made herself the admiration of the great Northwest. Disguised as a man she shadowed a detective who was searching for the stolen records and when he found the records Miss Walton captured
