"COMMERCIAL CUBA IN 1903."

This is the title of a monograph just issued by the new department of commerce and labor. In it is shown that, although nearly all of the land in the island is of excellent quality, and susceptible of a high degree of cultivation, not more than one-half of the area has been partially developed, and about one-twenty-fifth of it reduced to scientific and advanced cultivation. While the total area of the island is about 28,000,000 acres, the average of Cuba's magnificent cane fields is less than 500,000 acres, and her extensive crops of unripened tobacco are grown on the insignificant total of not to exceed 100,000 acres. The same condition is true regarding the manufacturing industries and possibilities of Cuba, with relation to their effects upon Cuban trade and commerce. A comparison is made of the tariff on several leading articles of commerce in the last four tariffs, namely the old Spanish tariff in force previous to 1890, the reciprocity tariff of 1891, the Spanish tariff of 1897, and the present tariff, framed under United States auspices in 1900. It appears that the volume of Cuban foreign commerce which naturally suffered a serious diminution during the recent war, has lately experienced an encouraging increase, and promises soon to outstrip the record of its past.

One of the most important features of the monograph relates to the recent tariffs of Cuba, with relation to their effects upon Cuban trade and commerce. A comparison is made of the tariff on several leading articles of commerce in the last four tariffs, namely the old Spanish tariff in force previous to 1890, the reciprocity tariff of 1891, the Spanish tariff of 1897, and the present tariff, framed under United States auspices in 1900. most days before the war. For example, Cuba's most important export, sugar, which amounted to over 950,000 tons in 1894, and will amount to over 1,000,000 tons in the present year, was only about 200,000 tons in 1893; and likewise the Cuban export of tobacco to the United States, which will equal \$13,000,000 in value in 1903, only amounted to about \$4,000,000 in 1897 and 1898. So also Cuban imports from the United States, which have amounted to \$20,000,000 or \$25,000,000 annually since the war, were only about \$7,000,000 in 1896 and 1897.

A BACK-NUMBER COUNTRY.

Recent arrivals in San Francisco from Panama via the Pacific Mail Steamship company's vessels say that Colombia's stand in the Panama revolution matter is very absurd to any who know of the weakness and instability of the government. Colombia is among the least progressive of our southern neighbors and is a country composed mostly of lazy half-breeds and renegades from all parts of the world. The better classes, that constitute only about 15 per cent of the population, are well educated and refined. They have a voice in the government, but the president's word is law and there is no law that can override it. Revolutionary movements have been frequent of late years and intrigue is ever undermining any effort that is made to better the conditions of the common people. The Colombians are given to loud boasting, but their "army of 100,000 men well drilled" is a mere rabble of untrained boys and men, loyal enough to their cause, but entirely without any idea of the methods of modern warfare. The other South American republics, especially Chile and Peru would not dream of supporting Colombia in a war with the United States or any other country.

A Modern Monte Cristo.

A correspondent of the London "Telegraph" tells an interesting story of a Monte Cristo living in the island of Galita, the ancient Calathea. This island, or rather islet, is off the north coast of Tunis, between it and the mainland. Not far from it passes the submarine cable from the African coast to Malta. It is said that the place had long been neglected by the French government, but lately it was visited by a representative of the resident general at Tunis. That official found there an Italian, named Darco, who has a large family and a curious history. The Italian had to leave his native land owing to an affair in 1850. He went to Galita, and in exploring the island, entered a cavern, where, just like the mariner whom the imagination of the elder Dumas turned into a millionaire, he found a treasure. In a large hole were heaps of Spanish doubloons and piastres and many gold and silver coins from various countries. Signor Darco long sat dazzled before the doubloons. Then he selected a few handfuls of these coins and started for Naples, where he changed the old money, supposed to have been left in the cavern by the pirates, or corsairs, who once infested the Mediterranean, for current cash of the day. He returned toward his island, staying for a time at La Calle, in Algeria, a place much frequented by Italian fishermen from Torre del Greco, on the Bay of Naples, and other places. In that direction, at La Calle, Darco married an Italian woman, bought a collection of agricultural implements, carpenter's tools and provisions, started for his treasure island, and founded a family there. Signor Darco is still a vigorous and energetic person, and he refuses to accept French nationality or to acknowledge the jurisdiction of the resident general in Tunis. He went recently to Rome, with the intention of inducing the Italian government to take up his case against France, but he was cold-shouldered. He is now, it is said, applying for some sort of protection to the new Pope Pius X.
