**Since He Began to
Search For His Run-
away Wife**

**Who Eloped With An Ex-
Convict With a Bad
Record In Two
States**

Seattle, Nov. 28.—In an untiring search for his erring wife, who eloped last August with Frank Stice, J. B. Small of Oswego, Ore., has traveled thousands of miles, and is now in Seattle, hoping to obtain here some clue to the whereabouts of the woman whom, in spite of her perfidy, he still loves.

Since his wife left him Small's hair and beard have grown white with worry and grief. He says he is afraid Mrs. Small is in destitute circumstances somewhere, as the man with whom she eloped is a villain of the deepest dye, and would not hesitate to desert her should he wish to do so.

After trailing her for more than a month Small met and talked to his wife in Seattle, and she implored his forgiveness, and promised to return with him, but in some way she eluded him again, and returned once more to her lover.

Since then Small has surrendered all business interests, and is following every clue which might enable him to find her again.

Stice is a French Canadian, whose veins contain Indian blood. He has a bad record, and was in the Arizona penitentiary.

For any information regarding the whereabouts of his wife Mr. Small will gladly pay a suitable reward.

American Captain Insulted.
New York, Nov. 28.—The captain of the Royal mail steamer Trent, which arrived at Colon from Cartagena reported, according to a Colon dispatch to the American, that while he was lying in the harbor of Cartagena, the United States consul at that place, Luther F. Ellsworth, was invited to come aboard as his (the captain's) guest. Mr. Ellsworth responded to the invitation, but, when half way up the gang-plank was stopped by Colombian soldiers and turned back. The Colombian authorities would not permit the Trent to take on any passengers, mail or cargo from Colombian ports for Colon.

Consul Ellsworth told the people on the Trent he had been repeatedly insulted by the Colombian officials since the recognition of the independence of Panama by the United States.

Washington, Nov. 28.—Semi-official information has reached here this morning from Caracas that Venezuela won't reply to Morroquin's appeal on behalf of Colombia to the Central South American republics, except in the way of a formal acknowledgement that Venezuela regards the Panama affair as a controversy solely between Colombia and the United States.

Reyes Arrives at Washington.
Washington, Nov. 28.—General Reyes arrived this morning, and was met at the train by Colombian Minister Herranz. He declined to discuss his mission, and denies the warlike utterances en route from New Orleans; complains that over-zealous reporters published false interviews. Reyes intends, as soon as his trunks, containing his uniforms, arrive, to visit the various legations of the South Central American republics, in the hope to induce them to join with Colombia in a protest against the United States' action at Panama.

TERRIBLE STREETCAR COLLISION
On the Lake Union and University
Line at Seattle.

Seattle, Nov. 28.—Two loaded street cars on the University line collided head-on during a heavy fog this morning. Harry Kinney, telephone lineman, had a leg crushed, and was internally injured. Motorman Hammond had his hip crushed, and was terribly bruised and cut about the body, he may die. Ten others were more or less seriously injured.

Shot a Boy for a Burglar.
Chicago, Nov. 28.—John Wheelis, a groceryman, mistook a 16-year-old boy, Geo. Reynolds, passing by his store early this morning, for a burglar, and shot and killed him. The boy is a son of a police captain at St. Louis, and expected to start home today.

A New Orleans fire early today destroyed the plant of the National Biscuit Company, and badly damaged contiguous property to the value of a quarter of a million.

At Fort Worth, Texas, an explosion of glycerine tank in Swift soap department this morning killed one, and injured several, badly damaging the building.

A Butte telegram today says the expected clash between 50 soldiers and a band of Nez Perces, under Morrigoua, who are defying the collection of taxes, has been prevented by Morrigoua's surrender. The troops returned to the plains this morning.

At Philadelphia the circuit court of appeals this morning confirmed the appointment of James Smith, Jr., as receiver of the United States Ship-building trust.

A cable today says five fishing smacks foundered off the island of Heligoland, in the North Sea, and 15 were drowned.

John Mitchell leaves Indianapolis tomorrow for Trinidad, Colo., where he will establish headquarters and direct the Colorado miners' strike. He will first attempt a settlement.

Jules Levy, the famous contortionist, died at Chicago today of apoplexy. He was aged 62.

Bryan took lunch with Joe Chamberlain at London today. He goes to Dublin tonight, where he expects to speak.

Grover Cleveland is out in a letter unalterably and conclusively refusing to be a candidate.

Judge J. J. Murphy, clerk of the Oregon supreme court, is reported recovering from a stroke of paralysis.

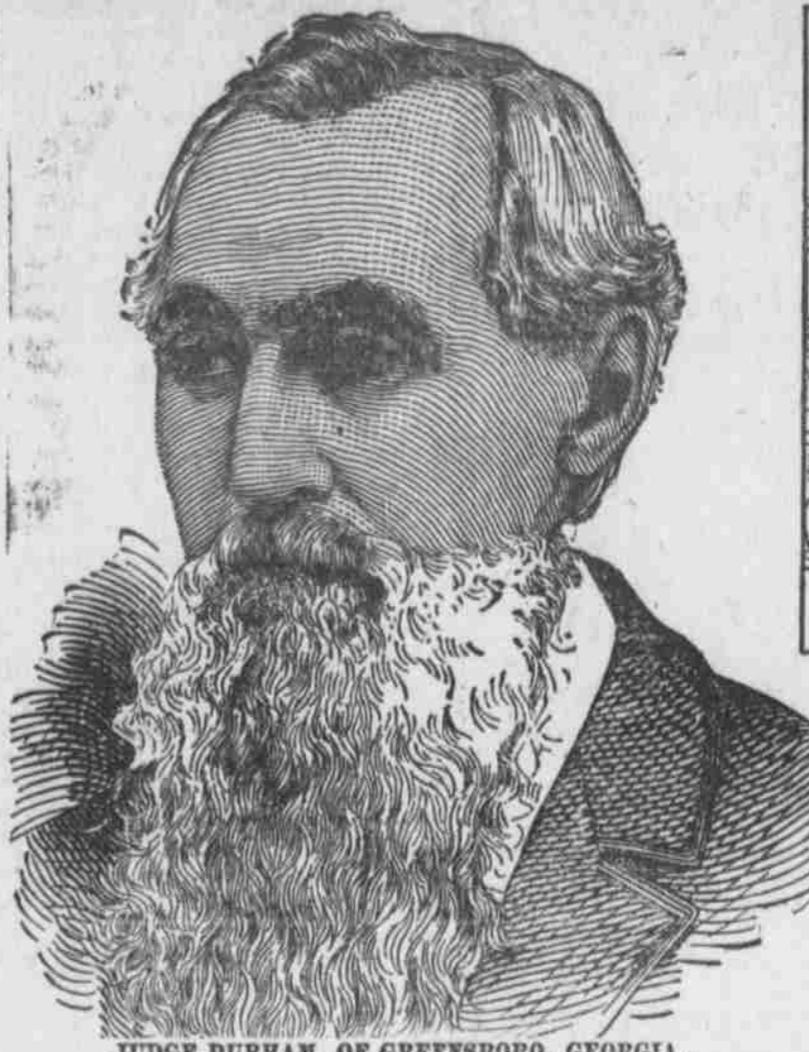
The German emperor has not sufficiently recovered so that his physicians will permit him to travel.
