around them. Shot Down From Darkness.

The robbery and murders at the car barns marked an epoch in the history of crime in Chicago. The raid took place early on the morning of Aug. 30. Protected by the darkness, the robbers stood outside the brilliantly lighted office of the Sixtyfirst street barns, and shot down three of the four men at work within. Then one of the desperadoes smashed his way into the office with a sledge, seized all the bills in sight, and ran

So carefully was the robbery planned and so coolly was it carried out that none of the twenty-five men at work in the building obtained more than a fleeting glance at the robbers. The elaborate burglar alarms with which the office was fitted were useless, because the men who stood year them were killed before they could raise a hand to touch them John B. Johnson, a motorman, was

slooping in the employe's waitingroom. As he ran toward the robbers one of them shot him through the temple, and he died instantly.

Frank Stewart, 6839 Parnell avenue and an Armour institute student, was another of the victims. He was Wanted,-Wood choppers good pay shot in the abdomen and died twenty minutes later.

One Employs Wounded.

The two other occupents of the office just escaped with their lives. William D. Edman, 223 Jackson Park torrace was shot through the thigh, and lay helplens. Henry Biehl, 5915 State sizect the only man unlajured, saved himpoif by crawling head first into a cupboard and feigning death.

The attack came at 3 o'clock. The men were marks. There was no word of warning or order from the robbors. They simply broke in a pane of gians and began sheeting with magazine revolvers at the rate of two bullets per second. The robbers knew perfectly the location of wires and burglar alarms, and money. All they had to do was to shoot down the office force and carry off the booty.

It was Biohl who crawled out and gave the ainrm and supported Stewart

on his knee until he died. It was one of the most daring and coldblooded murders ever perpetrated in Chicago. For months it has baffled

Many false clews were run to earth, and many persons suspected of the crime or damaging knowledge of it, were arrested and lodged in the couny jail. The most prominent of these suspects was John Sluder.
