MAKES CAPTORS CAPTIVE.

Murderer Makes Sensational Escape From Calgary Police Barracks.

Vancouver, B. C. Dec. 14.—Ernest Cashel, the young fellow, 21 years old, who murdered an American rancher named Rufus Bell, at Red Deer, made a daring and successful escape from the mounted police barracks at Calgary, Alberta Wednesday. He was to be hanged December 15th.

When his cell was searched shortly after 6 o'clock Cashel pulled two revolvers on the three guards and ordered them from the corridor into his cell, just vacated, locked the door, demanded the keys of his shackles, which he unlocked, and then made his escape from the building. He kissed his hands to the police as he headed south for the United States.

John Cashel, a brother of the murderer, who visited the barracks on that day, has been arrested on suspicion of having furnished Ernest with the revolvers.

News has just been received from the department of justice at Ottawa, that if murderer Ernest Cashel is not recaptured before December 15th, for which date his execution was set, he cannot subsequently be hanged, as he will then be dead to the law.

The minister of justice has telegraphed to the chief of the Northwest Territories to relieve Cashel for four weeks, so that if the murderer is recaptured another date for the execution may be set.

HOLY ROLLERS.

Take Possession of the Methodist Prayer Meeting at Eugene.

The Register says: Eugene seems to be doomed to endure a sensation similar to that inflicted upon the people of Corvallis recently by the alleged devotees of a religious faith which calls upon its followers for the most ridiculous performances. The name of "Holy Rollers" has been applied to them, and whether a better name could be chosen is doubtful.

Most unexpectedly did three of the self-styled "chosen of God" make their appearance last night, much to the annoyance of the good people of the Methodist Episcopal church during the hour of the weekly prayer meeting services. The usual exercises were progressing in appropriate manner, when suddenly the worshippers were surprised and startled by the breaking out of three strangers, whose looks and actions bespoke unusual excitement, and whose vociferous and blustering hallelujahs were most annoying.

They went on with their frantic performances, disregarding the wishes of the people of the church, and apparently not caring for the fact that they were unwelcome trespassers, broken up for the evening.

As near as can be learned from their sayings and actions, they are a part of the aggregation that has been so obnoxious about Corvallis; at least that is the conclusion of all who have seen them. Many express the belief that they will open up headquarters, and attempt to carry on their orgies

FOLLOW AMERICAN LEAD.

New Santo Domingo Government Must Keep Contracts.

Santo Domingo, Dec. 14.—United States Minister Powell has been officially informed that the provisional government is not disposed to accept as final the settlements of American claims made with the late government of President Wos y Gil. Minister Powell has informed the provisional government his government expects a full compliance with all the agreements entered into by the United States government with the former governments of General Wos y Gil and General Valesquez, and that his government will not recognize the provisional agreement until it acknowledges all the agreements made with pending administrations.

The British, French and German and Belgium ministers have refused to recognize the provisional government, and will not give it formal recognition until similar action is taken by the United States. Quiet prevails here, though the financial condition of the provisional government is a desperate one.
