## Salem Young Men's Republican Club's First Dinner

#### Called to Order.

#### President Patton's Speech.

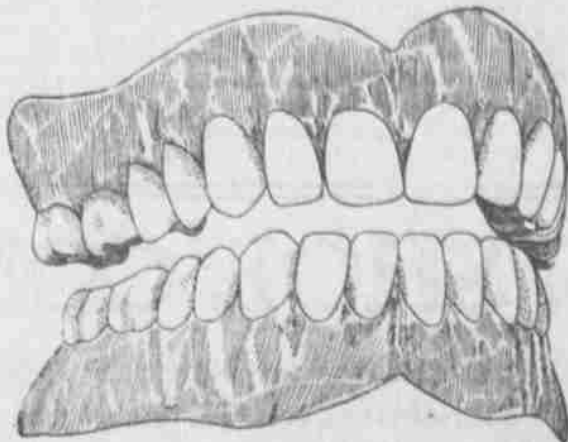
