CHEMAWA VERSUS RELIANCE

The Indians Meet Californians and Defeat Them

A Fine Game of Clean Football, Played Fair and for All There Was in It

The best football game of the season was played here yesterday afternoon, when the All-California team, under the name of Reliance, met the Chemawa Indian team on the Willamette field, and the Indians won the contest, after one of the best-played games ever seen in Salem. The teams were not evenly matched as regards weight, for the Reliance men weighed an average of 170 pounds, and the Indians' average weight was only 152 pounds. The best players for the Indians were Foster, Sanders, Moon and Harris, while for the Reliance, Hamilton, Smock and Goschen played well.

Chemawa kicked off, sending the ball to the 25-yard line, where Reliance stopped it, and from then on began a battle, the Californians pushing the Indians steadily back, until finally, after a desperate struggle, they pushed the ball over the Indians' goal line, but here they lost the ball on a fumble, and Chemawa secured it and scored a touchdown, the Indians thus saving themselves, and preventing the Reliance from scoring a touchdown. The Indians having the ball, at once began to advance on the Californians, and soon sent the ball toward the other end of the field, and on a punt the

Reliance fumbled, but securing the ball began to batter the Indian line. This was hopeless, however, for they lost the ball on downs, and Chemawa punted, sending the ball to the 5-yard line. Here California made a desperate effort to regain their ground, and on a punt gained some yardage, but Harris catching the ball on the run, one of the prettiest plays of the game, advanced it into the California territory, and the Indian quarterback sent it over the line, where Saunders caught it and scored a touchdown. Saunders kicked goal, and the score stood 6 to 0.

Reliance kicked off, and sent the ball far into the Chemawa territory, but the Indians secured the ball and carried it back, when the Californians again got the pigskin, and, on a fake play, gained a big advantage, carrying it fully 35 yards, and when time was called for the first half, the ball died in the Indians' territory.

In the second half Reliance kicked off, but Chemawa secured the ball, and began to advance at once into the Reliance territory, and, after a hot fight, pushed the ball to the line. Green finally carrying it over, amid the wildest enthusiasm. Sanders kicked for goal, but missed, and the game stood 11 to 0.

Chemawa kicked off for the second time, and the battle waged in California's territory, and the ball was finally kicked over in the direction of Teabo, Chemawa's quarterback, who made the sensational play of the day, for he caught the ball, and started down the field with it. A burly Californian met him and attempted to tackle the little Indian, but Teabo, leaping high in the air, sprang clear over the Reliance player, and, lighting on his feet, raced down the field. He cleared another California player with a bound, but was tackled and dropped to the ground, hugging the ball to his breast. After a sharp fight, the Indians finally succeeded in kicking the ball over the line, but the Californians secured it, and sent it back over the line. Chemawa again made an effort to carry the ball over the goal line, and finally scored another touchdown, but failed of a goal kick, and the score stood 16 to 0 in favor of the Chemawa Indians when time was called.

The game was entirely devoid of "ragging," and was enjoyed by a large crowd. It was a splendid exhibition of football, the best game of the season, and will long be remembered by all those who witnessed it.

A VENERABLE WOMAN.

Mrs. Mary Ramsey Wood, of Hillsboro, Aged 116 Years.

The oldest woman on the Pacific coast, the belle of East Tennessee a century ago, and at one hundred and sweet sixteen not a bad looking elderly lady. Mrs. Mary Wood is enjoying her old age surrounded by her great-grandchildren in her Hillsboro home. A group picture recently taken, shows the babies of the family in four generations: Mrs. Mary Ramsey Wood, born in East Tennessee on May 20, 1787. Mrs. Catherine Wood Reynolds, born in Nashville, Tenn., October 14, 1830, the youngest daughter of Mrs. Wood. Mrs. Jennie Reynolds Olsen, born in Hillsboro, January 13, 1865, the granddaughter, and Miss Gertha Olsen, also born in Hillsboro on July 8, 1890, great-granddaughter, a young lady, is over 100 years younger than its oldest member.

Until recently the centenarian really did not know how old she was, a reputed female falling in this instance owing to the family records having gone to the bottom of the river in rafting across a stream when she came to Oregon in 1849, but she believed herself to have been born six years later until a cousin in Missouri found a bible giving her birth entry, with the date May 20, 1787.

Fifty years and over ago, when Mrs. Wood kept the Washington house, Hillsboro's first hotel. It was remarked how active she was in riding horseback over the country for a person of her age, and Henry Wehrung, now a white haired old man, recalls in his boyhood having first met Grandma Wood, and that she then was gray-haired and venerable. The late Representative Tongue visited Knoxville, Tenn., on one of his trips to Congress, and there met several old people who

remembered her, all as having been an old woman when they were children.

Here, indeed, is an exception to the Psalmist's limit of days to the three-score and ten years, for she has prolonged hers past fourscore, beyond fivescore, to nearly six score, nor are they apparently a sorrow for she takes a lively interest in all passing around daily with her cane exercises in walking, seeks to instill in her great-grandchildren habits of thrift and economy, and in good health, with unimpaired bearing and fair memory, is not at all childish; but more active and vigorous than many 50 years younger. Her mother lived to be 105, and to Mrs. Wood it seems perfectly natural that she should be long-lived. So she looks forward to coming years, and it is not at all unlikely that she who as a young woman heard of Lewis and Clark's expedition of the Oregon country will be present as one of the most interesting spectators at that important event.—Hillsboro Dispatch.
