## WOMEN BOTH CERTAIN

### Trial of Rev. E. H. Kennedy at Hillsboro in Progress

#### Both Ladies Swear Positively That Kennedy Was the Man Who Robbed Them

Hillsboro, Jan. 14.—The trial of Rev. E. H. Kennedy began here yesterday.

The first witness for the state was Mrs. Mackinder. She testified that she was visiting with Miss Warren, and that early in the morning of September 1st she was awakened by the odor of chloroform in her room. It was dark, and she called to Miss Warren, who occupied the adjoining room. She felt a heavy hand touch her shoulder, and cried out. Immediately Miss Warren came into the room, struck a match and said:

"There is a man in the room." Miss Warren then went down stairs to get the aid of her father, who is quite elderly. During this time the lamp was lighted by the burglar, Mrs. Mackinder thinks, as she did not light it herself. She testified that she first saw the burglar at the door of the room, and that as soon as she saw him she said to herself, "That is the man who killed the snake," mentally referring to an incident of a day or two previous, when Kennedy, who was cutting wood at the Warren ranch, had killed a snake that had crossed in front of the witness.

Dressed Laborer, Spoke as Gentleman. At that time she had an introduction to Kennedy, and thanked him for the trifling service. She stated that she noticed his articulation and language at the time, the more so because he carried an ax, and that he used the language of an educated man, rather than that of a laborer. After the introduction she understood the situation.

She said that when Miss Warren and her father came up stairs the robber asked her to give him her money, and that she gave him her purse, containing between \$7 and \$10, her watch, and that he afterwards took her ring. She said that Warren was then asked if he had any money, and that a negative reply was given. He then went to Warren in a little bedroom, across the vestibule, and went back to the frightened ladies.

On cross-examination the witness testified materially the same as upon the preliminary trial, with the exception of a few details. For a full hour she was under a rapid fire by counsel for Kennedy, who is one of the most acute criminal lawyers, and her idea of identification was not shaken. She testified that she arrived at Rev. Mr. Talbot's, upon leaving the scene of the robbery, at about 2:45, and sent Mr. Talbot after aid. Asked by Mr. Huston if she could not have been mistaken as to identification, she replied:

"I am not mistaken."

Miss Warren testifies. Miss Warren was then called, and testified that she was the hostess of Mrs. Mackinder, and that she was present at the time of the robbery. She had been awakened by Mrs. Mackinder's screams, and rushed to the room. Striking a match she discovered a man in the room, and ran out to call her father, who slept on the ground floor.

She testified that Kennedy was familiar with the place, and that he and his wife had occupied Mrs. Mackinder's room some months before, and that one of the little boys had slept in the room into which the burglar had forced Mr. Warren.

She said that there were two doors on that side of the vestibule, each looking like the other, and that only some one familiar with the house would have known of this room. Mr. Kennedy had taken a glass of water to his son when he was occupying the room.

She saw Mr. Kennedy.

When asked the question: "Did you see Mr. Kennedy in the house the night of the robbery," the reply came:

"Yes, sir; I saw Mr. Kennedy there."

There seems to be absolutely no doubt in the minds of these two ladies that the intruder was Rev. Mr. Kennedy. Each, so far as the testimony has progressed, swears positively that Kennedy is the man who committed the crime.

## BILLION DOLLAR PROJECT

### Lattimer Wants the Government to Provide Good Roads

#### It Should Give Five Hundred Million and the People Should Put Up a Like Sum

Washington, Jan. 14.—Lattimer, of South Carolina, made a speech in the senate today in advocacy of his bill creating a bureau of highways, and carrying an appropriation of \$24,000,000. He said this amount would be divided equally between the states and territories, according to population, the minimum allotment being \$250,000 to any state having less than 750,000 inhabitants. It further provides that any state or territory receiving such benefit must contribute dollar for dollar from its own treasury. The senator placed the surplus in the government treasury at \$260,000,000, which he declared, really belongs to the people. He declared it was wrong to hoard the people's money. It is not necessary to meet the public debt before 1907, and current expenses are provided for. He contended that better roads were a national necessity, and, therefore, a proper object for national aid. As the rivers and harbors were improved, so should the highways be. He declared the average cost of transportation of a ton over a mile of dirt road in America was 25 cents, while in Europe, with the roads improved, it was 10 cents. He denied that the government was liable to become bankrupted by the project. He said a billion would put all the main roads in good condition, and require from the government but fifty millions per year for ten years.

## PI-UTES RAN A BLUFF

Pioche, Nev., Jan. 14.—The threatened Indian uprising in Eastern and Southern Nevada, as a result of the death sentence upon a 14-year-old Indian for killing the desperado, William Williams at Las Vegas, New Mexico, has been averted by commuting the sentence to life imprisonment. Hundreds of ranchers, prospectors and business men and the judge who sentenced him, signed the petition, as the Piute chiefs threatened all the whites in Lincoln county.

### Live Decoys for Ducks.

Albany, Or., Jan. 14.—On exhibition at the poultry show now being held in this city are some gray call ducks, with the aid of which Warren H. Hulbert, their owner, who resides in Linn county, a few miles from Albany, has killed about 500 wild ducks this season. The birds are splendid decoys, and already this year have helped in luring hundreds of wild ducks to their death.

In a small lake near his home Mr. Hulbert places these gray call ducks, and then scatters wheat about on the shores. Large numbers of wild ducks are attracted to the place, and are easy prey for the hunters lying in wait. About twice each week Mr. Hulbert and his neighbors, who assist him, lie in ambush for the wild ducks, and do not molest them the rest of the time. Usually each hunter succeeds in killing almost his limit of 50 birds. In this way they kill about 1000 wild ducks each week when the weather conditions are satisfactory, and Mr. Hulbert says he has already sent about 5000 wild ducks to the Portland market this year.

### Mrs. Bechtel on Trial.

Allentown, Pa., Jan. 14.—The formal trial of Mrs. Bechtel, who is charged with being a principal and accessory to the murder of her daughter, Mahel, began this morning. She pleaded not guilty.

### Have Four Jurors.

Chicago, Jan. 14.—The fourth juror in the car barn bandits' trial was secured this morning. Roeski, the brother of the bandit, who is accused of attempting to liberate the prisoners, was released on bail this morning.

## LINER MAY BE LOST

Portland, Me., Jan. 14.—The steamer Cornishman, which arrived Wednesday from Liverpool, reports that on January 3d she sighted the Red Star line steamer Noordland, from Liverpool for Philadelphia, in a disabled condition. The Noordland was hove to during a gale, and displayed two red lights, signalling that she was unmanageable. Owing to the heavy seas the Cornishman lost sight of her.

The Captain of the Cornishman said the Noordland appeared to be weathering the gale safely, and he believes she must have made temporary repairs.

The Noordland sailed from Liverpool on December 30th.

### Ear Grafting a Hoax.

The story sent out from New York recently of a Western millionaire paying \$5000 for a human ear, and having it transplanted to his own head to replace a missing organ, is declared to be a hoax.

The story is said to have been invented by a group of physicians, a newspaper space writer, a traveling salesman and one or two others, who meet occasionally in New York, and who find amusement in concocting and circulating stories which, on account of their unusual features, will attract wide attention. This same group is said to have started the story that Elbert Hubbard was refused a room at the Waldorf-Astoria, and also the story of an elopement of Elbert Hubbard's son.

The operation alleged to have taken place in Philadelphia, by which an ear was transplanted from the head of one man to that of another, is declared by a Chicago physician, to whom credit is given for uncovering the "fake," to be impossible.—St. Paul Dispatch.

### Preservation of Eggs.

In a report to the department of commerce and labor, Consul General Richard Guenther at Frankfort-on-Main, Germany, tells of a German process for the preservation of eggs. He says:

"German papers state that it is possible to keep eggs fresh for any length of time by simply immersing them in a 10 per cent solution of silicate of soda, known as liquid glass. This produces the formation of a coating which renders the eggs perfectly air tight. The eggs so treated retain their fresh taste for many months. The best proof of the efficacy of this treatment has been furnished by the fact that such eggs, after having been kept a whole year, were hatched, and the chickens were strong and healthy."

The preserving solution is best prepared by dissolving 1 pound of liquid glass in four quarts of cold water. The eggs are then immersed in this solution for a short time. If one of these preserved eggs is to be boiled, the shell must first be perforated, in order to prevent cracking."

## NOTES FROM DAWSON

### Yukon Council Does Business With the Public Funds

#### Sluicing Going on the Water Being Kept From Freezing by a System of Steam Pipes

Dawson, Y. T., Jan. 11.—The special session of the Yukon council, called to distribute federal funds and pass an amendment to the interpretation ordinance, ended Tuesday. Only four members beside the governor were present, the body lacking one of being a quorum. Clark and Thompson, the beligerent members, stayed away.

The governor and his supporters ignored the absence of the quorum and in three minutes and 15 seconds advanced the bills three stages, declaring them passed, voting away the money of the territory at the rate of \$35,000 a minute.

Councilman Landerville, member from the Creeks, was petitioned by the miners to stand by Clark and Thompson in the council.

Buell, for several years cartoonist on the government organ, has been engaged by the News, which is a strict opposition paper.

Dr. Alfred Thompson, of the Yukon council, and leader of the opposition in Dawson, leave for the outside tomorrow.

James F. McDonald has been elected mayor of Dawson. Welch ran 11 votes behind and Davis followed last. Dr. Gillie, William McKay, Duff Pattullo, A. Lalonde, John Timmins and Isaac Lusk were elected aldermen.

Lilly Devarley, the South Dawson storekeeper, was robbed by a lone burglar last week. The burglar entered the store about midnight and made her give up all the cash she had and then he made his escape.

"Hobo Bill" Donnenworth, the best-known driver on the White Pass stage route, was thrown off his sleigh the last trip and sustained a broken leg.

Grant Jennings was stricken with paralysis while cutting wood near Stewart. He laid helpless in the snow for several hours, suffering physical pain and mental torture in fear of freezing to death. By mere chance he was found by another woodchopper and taken to camp.

Sluicing in open air in midwinter is in progress on Ten-Below Bonanza. The dirt is thrown directly in the sluice boxes before it has had time to freeze. The water is kept warm by steam pipes running lengthwise through the sluice boxes.

Dawson is to have an up-to-date brewery by March 1. Tom O'Brien has organized a company and secured a permit from the government to operate a licensed plant.

## COWBOY MARY WALKER

A remarkable case of a woman masquerading as a man has just come to light near Rockville, in the western part of Idaho near the Oregon line. A few days ago Joe Monagan, a well-known cowboy, died suddenly at the residence of Barney Mallory on Succor creek in Oregon. When the body was being prepared for burial it was found the deceased was a woman. She had ridden the ranges of Eastern Oregon for 25 years and was widely known as an expert, faithful, untiring cowboy.

She worked for the cattlemen during the summer and in winter looked after stock of her own, of which she possessed quite a herd. The woman was small of stature, but very active and strong, and was an expert shot with revolver and rifle. Her home was in a dugout near Rockville. She was well liked by all who knew her well, but she avoided people much, except as she came in contact with them in her work. Deceased was about 54 years of age. Nothing is known of her antecedents. She served on juries in Oregon and voted at all elections.

### LEFT MINDED PEOPLE.

The Way the Brain's Orders Are Announced and Obeyed.

Both sides of the brain are capable of performing the duties of giving

commands to the limbs, but the orders only come from one side, either from the right or left, but if the side upon which the speech center lies gets injured and is rendered incapable of performing its duty then the other side takes up the work, though it requires some time before it can do it properly.

Supposing a man meets with a bad fall or accident of any kind which damages the speech center on the left he becomes dumb for the time being. Then the right side slowly learns how to give orders, and the man gradually regains power of speech after some years, but in many cases he becomes left handed because now the orders from the brain are transmitted more rapidly to the left than to the right.

You have often experienced, I suppose, the curious feeling that you have done something or met some one at some time or other when in reality you have not done so at all.
