The Breyman property on Commer cial street, adjoining the old White Corner, on the south, and now occupled by a couple of old one-story frame tructures, will be one of the most imsortant of the new buildings erected this year. A fine two-story brick building, 53 by 90 feet, with full basement, will be erected on this property. The front will be of pressed brick, and it will be fitted for modern up-to-date business houses, with hot water heat ing plant, and all modern improvements. Every foot of the new building has been leased for a term of years, and its completion will add greatly to the business section of the city. Stockton & Co., who are now in the adjoining building, owned by the Breymans, will occupy a part of this new structure, as they are compelled to have more room for their rapidly growing trade.

Dr. J. H. Brewer, who some time ago purchased the Dr. Rowland property, corner of Court and Liberty streets, has broken ground for a fine, modern business block. The excavation for the basement has been completed, the concrete basement is finished, and, as soon as the weather permits, the building will go up. It will be a modern two-story brick, the ground floor to be occupied as a drug store and the upper floors as offices. The building will be fitted with all modern conveniences, and Dr. Brewer says it will be the equal in every way of the best modern business houses in the city.

Wm. Hagar, the Fairfield hop grower, has purchased a sightly lot on the corner of Cottage and Union streets, and plans have been prepared for a fine two-story residence to be erected on the property in the spring. The building is to cost from \$4500 to \$5000, and will be one of the most beautiful and comfortable homes in the city. It will be occupied by Mr. Hager and family, as they will reside in this city in future.
