Wednesday night a couple of thieves broke into the store of Austin & Finzer, at Woodburn, and carried away a quantity of goods, including several overcoats, four suits of clothing, some sweaters, shoes and other articles. Yesterday Marshal Amos Beach, of Woodburn, started out to run the men down, and toward evening, while walking along the railroad track toward Woodburn, he met the two men. He was close upon them before he realized he was facing the burglars, and before he could cover them with a gun the two miscreants seized the officer, took his revolver away from him, and beat him shamefully, leaving him to lie by the side of the road. Parties are searching the country for the two men, and it is possible that a bloody conflict will result if the searching parties come up with the criminals.

Using the Lake.

The Klamath Lake Navigation Co. now have a regular through daily passenger and freight service between Pokeyama and Klamath Falls over their boat route on lower Klamath lake. The boats now make two trips daily to Keno, a total of 96 miles. Passengers on the 5 a. m. boat arrive in Keno in time to take passage on the coaches which connect with the regular Pokeyama-Laird train, and the afternoon boat connects with coaches from the incoming train. The company are now figuring on building another launch on the same plan as the two now being used, but much larger.

BLOOD POISON SETS IN

W. D. Pettingell left this morning for the upper Santiam country in response to a letter advising him of the serious condition of his grandson, a boy 12 years old. About 10 days ago, while standing on a log with an open hunting knife in his hand, he slipped and fell, and the blade of the knife was driven by the force of the fall through his right wrist. The boy came near bleeding to death, and since the flow of blood has stopped he has not had the right care, and, as a consequence, blood poisoning has set in. It is probable that the patient will be brought down to Salem, if he can stand the trip, to undergo an operation.

One From Clatsop.

Sheriff Linville, of Clatsop county, accompanied by Mrs. Linville, brought Mrs. Brustad, a Norwegian woman to the asylum this forenoon. The woman is about 50 years old, and was a difficult patient to handle.
