PRETTY TEACHER KILLED

Her Body Found in a
Shed at Bedford
Indiana

The Surroundings Showed
That She Made a Ter-
rific Struggle for
Her Life

Bedford, Ind., Jan. 22 The body of Miss Sarah Schaffer, teacher of Latin in the high school, was found in a shed this morning. She was evidently brutally murdered, after a protracted struggle for her life. She was a local famous beauty.

Bloomington, Ind., Jan. 22.—Judge James Wilson has offered a private reward of \$500 for the arrest of Miss Schaffer's murderer.

Indianapolis, Jan. 22.—General Ward, of the Indiana national board, received a telegram from Bedford this afternoon, saying the negro who killed Miss Schaffer had been caught, and is in imminent danger of lynching. The militia has been asked for.

afternoon the water passed the 21-foot mark, and is rising rapidly. The Pittsburg & Western railway is submerged.

Caught in the Ice Pack.

Loraine, O., Jan. 22.—At noon 20 vessels are lying in a helpless block in the river, the ice jamming against them. The water is ten feet above normal, and the damage will already reach half a million. It is still raining.

The vessels in the mouth of the James river were swept out into the lake, where they are drifting helplessly.

Findlay Under Water.

Findlay, O., Jan. 22.—Many streets are under water, also portion of the residence sections. Two hundred families have been rescued. The damage is immense and the electric plants and power houses are under water. At noon three laborers were swept off the dam and drowned. John Mackey, an aged man, in trying to reach home, fell in a swollen creek, and was drowned.

Canton in the Swim.

Canton, O., Jan. 22.—All the electric lines are tied up.

Pittsburg Needs an Ark.

Pittsburg, Jan. 22.—Telegraphic warnings from the weather bureau forecast the breaking of the ice gorge in the Allegheny river. The police department is notifying the business houses and residents in the threatened districts. The worst flood in 40 years is expected. Reports from over the entire state shows an unprecedented rush of waters.

CORVALLIS BIRDS.

Are to Be Used in Stocking Chehalis County, Washington.

Chehalis county, Washington, is to be stocked with China pheasants and Corvallis birds are to be used for the purpose. From his poultry pen in this city, Samuel Bane has sold fifteen pairs of birds which are to be used as parent stock, and they are to be shipped on the 10th of February. At the proper season the pheasants are to be turned loose in the county, where proper restrictive regulations have been made for their present protection. The buyer of the birds is the county court of Chehalis county, under whose direction the importation is made, and subsequent protection guaranteed.

The sale reduces Mr. Bane's stock to 25, of which 13 are females and 12 males. A few days ago he had an order for 20 pairs, which he was unable to fill. If able to secure more extensive quarters for which he is looking, Mr. Bane will, the coming season engage more extensively in the business. The business pays better dividends than does the chicken industry, according to the statement of Mr. Bane. There is an easy sale of the eggs at \$2.50 per dozen. A pair of birds sells readily for \$5. The pheasants are less voracious

eaters than are chickens, and are accordingly less expensive to keep.

The hens are prolific in yielding eggs, three in a former season having turned off 195 eggs. The number is sufficient for 15 settings, which at \$2.50 per setting makes a gross profit of \$47.50 for the three hens, by the sale of eggs alone. Sold as mature birds the profit would be immensely increased.

For hatching and brooding, Mr. Bane uses artificial appliances, his pens being well supplied with incubators and brooders. A lady who conducts a successful business in the same line at Salem, uses Plymouth Rock hens for hatching and brooding.

Told of the Iron Duke.

The "Recollections" of the late John Calcott Horsley, the English painter, contains many anecdotes. Here is one about the Duke of Wellington. On one occasion, during the Assizes at Reading the judges were staying at Strathfeldsaye, with the great duke, who entertained them hospitably. The duke had various harmless eccentricities. One was that at breakfast time his favorite man servant used to bring in a long tray upon which were a number of small and beautiful silver teapots, one for each guest. Those were days when people were given their choice of black or green tea. The duke himself put the tea into each pot, questioning his guest individually. "What tea do you take, sir, black or green?" was asked in stentorian tones. Now young Denman (afterward Lord Denman) who was acting as marshal to his father, had been consumed with nervousness ever since he entered the house at the very thought of converse with his distinguished host, and when the question was shouted at him as to black or green, the bashful youth hesitated and stammered, and, when the question was put a second time, with some impatience, the reply came out with a rush at last. "I take it mixed, your grace." The duke was taken aback at the unaccustomed answer, but in a moment roared out, "Take Mr. Denman two pots." The table was convulsed.

Crabs Climb Trees.

In Africa there exists a tree-crab which has a trick of crawling up a coconut tree, biting off half a dozen bunches and then creeping down again backward. The theory is that the nuts are shattered by the fall, and the crab thus enjoys a hearty meal. Now, the natives try to stop these depredations, which often ruin the coconut crops, and take advantage of the fact that the lower portion of the crab is soft and sensitive. When they are heard in the tree the native climbs half way up the tree and drives in a circle of spikes made out of thorns. The consequence is, when the crab comes down he encounters the thorns, and, supposing that he has reached the ground, he lets go, and is so crippled by the fall that he is easily despatched and eaten in his turn.
