BROOKS REPUBS. ORGANIZE

A Club Was Formed and General Enthusiasm Prevailed

The Third of the Young Men's Organizations Has Been Started and More Will Follow

The Stalwart Sextette of the Salem Young Men's Republican Club went to Brooks last night and helped the young men there to organize a club. Some of the old Republicans were also out and, in spite of a counter-attraction, in the shape of a basket social at the Clear Lake school house, there was a good attendance, and considerable Roosevelt enthusiasm let loose. The prosperity boosters from Salem were Jos. G. Graham, J. C. Goodale, John Reynolds, Lou Stinson, Hal Patton, Ellis Richardson and a Journal reporter. All contributed to the destruction of provisions set up in an attractive manner at the Hotel de Brooks, and a very nice starter for what will be a rousing campaign club was organized. The band of young expansionists, who will be heard from several times before election, was corralled at the fine new Workman hall, and made comfortable by the local committee.

Homer Goulet called to order, and Clyde Harris was made secretary. Al Jones spoke favorably of the proposed organization. He thought a good rousing club could be secured in this precinct. Bruce Jones was heartily in favor of organizing a club. Thought it would do good.

Hal Patton believed in the organization of the young men. It was the neglect of the young men that had cost the Republicans of Marion county the sheriff's office for six years.

He was anxious for a strong organization in each precinct of the county. Al Jones, Homer Goulet and Bruce Jones were made a committee on constitution and by-laws.

A recess was taken until a constitution could be prepared, which was then adopted, and officers elected as follows:

Executive committee will be chosen at next meeting, in two weeks.

Remarks were made by a number of Republican speakers who were present, and a great deal of enthusiasm was created. The meeting was one of the best ever held in the Brooks precinct.

All sections were represented, and there was no factional spirit manifested in the composition of the officers. In fact, the younger Republicans know no factions. Some amusement was created by the introduction to the audience of the Prodigal Son and, while there was no fatted calf killed in honor of the home-coming of the erring and lost, there was a great deal of shouting and encouragement from the amen corner, and in conclusion there was a love-feast between two of the leaders of the old Brooks factions—Representative Chapman and Mattie L. Jones. This added greatly to the enjoyment of the evening, and all departed for home happier and wiser and better Republicans. At the conclusion three cheers were given for President Roosevelt the Salem Club and the Brooks Club.
