WOODMEN LAST NIGHT

**Organizer Geo. Rogers
Makes an Inter-
esting Address**

**Governor Chamberlain Also
Spoke--A Pleasant
Social Hour
Followed**

Last night marked a red letter time in the annals of the local camp of the Woodmen of the World the occasion being the open meeting in the Woodmen hall, addressed by some of the leading members of the fraternity in this state, among them Governor Chamberlain and Organizer Geo. K. Rogers. The meeting was well attended, fully 200 Woodmen and Women of Woodcraft being present, in addition to a number of invited guests, and all enjoyed the excellent addresses delivered.

Consul Commander Frazier called the meeting to order at 8 o'clock, and introduced Organizer Rogers, who delivered the address of the evening. He gave a brief account of the history of the organization, showed the progress made in the last 10 years, and the proud position in the ranks of the fraternal societies now occupied by the Woodmen. From a little, struggling organization, with \$30,000 indebtedness, and only 3000 members, he said, he Pacific Jurisdiction had grown to a membership of nearly 80,000, with a reserve fund of nearly a million dollars, and the work was still going on at as rapid a rate as ever in the past. He gave a clear and fair statement of the aims and objects of the institution, and wound up by urging the members to again begin active work in Salem, and to increase the membership of the order here by at least 100 in the next three months, as the local camp had decided some time ago to do.

Throughout his address Mr. Rogers illustrated his arguments with stories that kept his audience in a good humor, and when he finally stopped he was urged to continue.

Following Mr. Rogers, Governor Chamberlain made a brief but interesting speech on the aims and objects of the Woodmen order, and especially showed the practical benefits of a membership in the organization.

Several musical numbers were rendered, and a most enjoyable evening closed when the audience was dismissed by the consul commander.

At the close of the meeting an informal reception was tendered to Governor Chamberlain and Mr. Rogers, and all present had the opportunity to meet the two gentlemen, and a social hour was spent in the comfortable lodge hall before the "choppers" and their friends finally dispersed.

The result to the Woodmen will doubtless be good, for the members were enthused, and they will begin work with a will, and many members will doubtless be added to their ranks during the present campaign.

Prune Growers Incorporate.

The Butte Falls Prune Growers' association filed articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office today. The new corporation will grow, deal in and sell prunes in the open market for the benefit of its members, with headquarters at Scott's Mills. The capital is \$400. W. F. Drager, S. D. Adkins, W. H. Commons, I. N. Commons, J. S. Korb and M. H. Smith are the incorporators.

BOOZE MAKES TROUBLE

Jack Kearns, a night man in the Club stables, was last night arrested by Officer Murphy in the White House restaurant for disorderly conduct, and was landed in the city jail, after a brief struggle. Kearns was in the restaurant eating his midnight lunch, when, without cause, he became abusive, cursing the cook and waiter, and, incidentally, the patrons of the house. He was asked to keep quiet, and that seemed to fan his anger. Officer Murphy was in the house, and he quietly asked the man to behave himself, and reasoned with him. Kearns, in answer to the officer, began to abuse him, and then struck at him. The disturber was quickly removed from the restaurant, but on the street he again attempted to assault the officer, and in the struggle, and the two men fell, Officer Murphy spraining his ankle in the fall, while the prisoner's head was hurt by striking the cement walk. He was soon landed in the prison, however, where he spent the night.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon City Recorder Judah gave Kearns a hearing, and sentenced him to pay a fine of \$100, or serve 20 days in the city jail, and the latter alternative was chosen.
