Evening Dresses, Inexpensive Materials

Styles in Making: Jewelry and the Thousand and One Things That Make Style

Evening dresses of net made with gathered skirts and worn over Liberty satin are very pretty and if the net be washable, expense is reduced considerably as the material can be utilized after being soiled and in a family of girls, perhaps, made into some other garment or accessory. Sometimes these net skirts are trimmed with lace laid in medallions or indeed in any way dictated by taste. Another quite showy method of making a net dress is in sun ray kilts and with this style, rows of satin ribbon can be used effectively, their soft glimmer harmonizing with the brilliant sun ray kilting. After all, however, there is no material in quite such demand for evening as

Chiffon Velvet, the name indicating in part its texture since with the familiar surface of velvet the heaviness often found objectionable in velvet of the usual quality is done away with and the new variety lends itself readily to present ideas in soft drapings on shirrings. Taffeta silks should by no means be omitted from the list of favorite materials, the more so as it is often picked on bargain counters to much advantage and may be utilized in some other way when one is tired of it as a gown. Glace is another and not very expensive material for evening, and as the name would indicate, it has a shiny surface. For neighborhood gatherings where young people usually meet for enjoyment rather than show, wool canvas in white or evening colors is quite stylish and is suitably trimmed with yak lace. Voile is also to be commended as comparatively inexpensive and stylish and may be trimmed with wool lace.

Mousseline Voile is also quite handsome and a gown recently worn by a blonde beauty, is in pale blue shirred below the hips and again so as to form a deep flounce. The shirrings meet insertions of Irish point lace with fagottings in silk. The sleeves reach to the elbows and the full waist is almost concealed by a deep bertha of lace to match that on the skirt. Separate waists for evening have not the prestige accorded the entire dress, but nevertheless they appear as indispensable part of the outfit, and the fancy for all lace waists, amounts almost to a furor. White over white is the caprice of the hour, though less calculated to show off the pattern of the lace than when worn over colors.

In Jewelry many new and interesting features are presented, but dealers in precious stones find to their chagrin that their best designs are so skillfully imitated that their trade suffers not a little injury. Several stores on Broadway, quite handsome in appearance, are devoted to imitation goods, and ladies enter them unhesitatingly. Gold net work is very much in demand for necklaces, and a pointed front is finished by pendants of turquoise, pearls and other stones. Filigree collars showing a large figure at the center are new and flagrant collars straight around with stones set in and a single pendant in the middle of a contrasting stone, are among novelties. Loops of small pearls are also pendant from these collars. Small enamelled leaves tipped by a minute pearl, are beautifully refined and these may alternate with pear-shaped pendants and leaves. Much in favor for necklaces are small stones set very near each other, with five larger stones in the center and a bracelet to match, is stylish. In brooches, flags or birds sometimes single or in pairs in dull finish are presented and shaded green leaves tipped by small diamonds are lovely. One diamond is usually at the center. Then there are crescents with a single bird, tiny flowers, especially roses, or in quite opposite style, a gold wishbone in plain gold shows a single pear or diamond on one side.
