BASE-BALL LEAGUE

**Organized at Albany Sunday
and Stringent Rules
Adopted**

Paul H. Sroat spent Sunday in Albany, where he attended the meeting of the Willamette Valley Baseball League as a delegate from the Capital Amateur Athletic Club, to take part in the reorganization of the league for the coming season. He returned this morning as president of the league, having been elected to succeed Mr. Turner, of Albany.

When the representatives of the several clubs met yesterday afternoon, it was decided to disband the old organization, and form the Oregon State Baseball League. The teams represented were:

Salem, P. H. Sroat; Albany, G. C. Rawlings; Eugene, F. L. DuShane; Roseburg, W. E. Morrow.

The election of officers for the new league resulted as follows: President, P. H. Sroat; vice-president, L. R. Traver, of Eugene. The office of treasurer was consolidated with that of president, and the latter man was empowered to appoint a Salem man as secretary of the league, H. W. Meyers being suggested for the position. This places three officers in the Salem club, and only one outside of this city.

President Sroat was given authority to correspond with the Oregon City, Portland and Vancouver baseball clubs, with a view to securing the membership of two of these for the new league, thus making the membership six instead of four. The president was also instructed to correspond with President J. H. Farrell, of Auburn, N. Y., of the National Baseball League, and close arrangements for the protection of the new organization.

It was decided that fines this season should be limited to \$2.50, and that for a second offense the offending player should be ejected from the grounds.

The constitution adopted provides for a playing season beginning May 1st and ending September 15th. It also provides that any manager or captain withdrawing his team before the game is declared finished by the officials, shall be fined \$50, and the clubs are prohibited from paying any fines for managers, captains or players.

This new organization promises renewed interest in the national game, and the indications are that baseball will be a great attraction this summer.

He inferred that the Bonanza, in which he is a heavy owner, was not the only one in that promising and prolific section.—Baker City Democrat.

COUNTY ROAD PROGRESS

Good Roads Convention to Be Held at Salem

Local Leagues Should Be Organized and the Work of Education Pushed

Through the efforts of Judge Scott and others, Marion county is gaining the enviable reputation of being a leader in good roads building. There have been miles of broken rock and improved gravel roads built and many parts of the county have raised funds from several hundred to several thousand dollars to build permanent highways with the help of the county. There are enough of these funds raised now to keep four or five rock crushers at work as soon as the plans can be completed, and the finances arranged for letting the contracts.

Judge Scott is at the national good roads convention, and will visit several states where practical work has been done towards building progressive highways. He will push the work hard as soon as he returns, and 1904 will be a banner year of good road progress.

County Road Convention.

The Liberty Good Roads League has recently sent to the other leagues of this county a letter urging them to co-operate in holding a good roads convention for Marion county, to be held in Salem, early in March. It is hoped that the various leagues will readily see the benefits to be derived, and all will participate therein. It is desired to form a county league, which will push the work in all parts of the county, co-operating with the various local leagues. In this way Marion county could soon be placed in the lead in the good roads movement. Many features of the work could be profitably discussed at this convention, and especially the changes in the road laws, which are necessary before entirely satisfactory work can be done. Doubtless Judge Scott will have much of interest to report as a result of his Eastern trip and attendance at the national convention of good roads workers. Opportunity will also be given visitors to inspect the stone road built in the Liberty neighborhood last year. Leagues favoring a convention are expected to appoint one member, who will meet with those appointed by the other leagues, to arrange the time and place for the convention, program, etc.

The probable passage of the Brownlow bill by congress is an added incentive to all road workers to organize, and prepare to take advantage of the share of the appropriation which our state will receive, and it is highly desirable that Marion county may not be found wanting.

The Liberty people have adopted the plan of a systematic study of road building, and are being well repaid by the information gained thereby. The subject for their next meeting is the New York law, which is the best road law in the United States today. At succeeding meetings other subjects will be considered, and in this way a large number of people will become well informed along those lines. Other neighborhoods might well profit by this example.
