**GLOVER
PAYS THE
PENALTY**

Is Hanged at Folsom
for Killing His Sweet-
heart's Father

Mounted the Gallows, and
Was Dropped Out of the
World Without Say-
ing a Word

Folsom, Cal., Feb. 6.—W. H. Glover who murdered Frederick Nierhoff, near Auburn, Placer county, June 11 1902, was hanged at the prison today. He was pronounced dead in 14 minutes. Glover went bravely to the gallows, and, contrary to expectations, had nothing to say. He wrote a few letters last night and slept well. Glover was courting Nierhoff's 14-year-old daughter, Agnes, and Nierhoff objected, and ordered him to keep away. A few days later Nierhoff was standing in his yard talking with Oscar a brother of the condemned, when W. H. shot him. Glover claimed the killing was a self-defense, as did Miss Nierhoff. Subsequently, she testified the murder was cold-blooded, and her first statement was made under threat of death by the Glovers. Oscar was tried for complicity, and acquitted.

Socialist Convention.

The Socialist state convention has been called to meet in Portland for March 3, 1904, at 10 a. m., for the purpose of nominating state and district candidates. The call is issued by C. H. Harnish, president, and W. S. Richards, secretary of the state committee, and the meeting will be one of the largest gatherings of the Socialists ever held in the state.

Coleman Plead Guilty.

This forenoon Coleman appeared before City Recorder Judah, and plead guilty to simple larceny, and was sentenced to serve 60 days in the county jail. He was at once taken to the court house, and placed in the care of Sheriff Colbath.
