Loo Out for Jack Johnson
for Sheriff From the
Mighty North End of
Marion County

W. L. Tooze, the Woodburn postmaster, was in Salem yesterday, and when asked by a Journal reporter as to the political situation in that section of Marion county, he said that the former factional feeling was being suppressed, and the tendency was for a compromise delegation to the county convention without the bitter factional fighting heretofore known in Woodburn, the battle ground of Marion county. The sentiment there, he said, was almost entirely favorable to Mitchell, Fulton and Hermann, and there was no bitterness in the political atmosphere.

The section of Marion county will appear before the Republican convention with several aspirants for nomination. Col. J. M. Poorman is reported to be seriously thinking of being a candidate for the legislature and C. T. Bonney is also said to have aspirations that way.

Judge E. P. Morecum is pluming himself for the race for circuit judge, to succeed Judge Boise, and Jack Johnson is an avowed candidate for sheriff. A good story is told on the latter gentleman. It is said he decided several months ago to run for sheriff, but was uncertain as to what ticket he should go on, hesitating for some time between the Republican and Democratic nomination. He finally decided, so it is said, that the chances were more favorable to the Republican ticket, and he is determined to secure the nomination in the convention of that party for the sheriff's place, satisfied that if he is named his election will surely follow. Jack is a scrapper, and always was a free lance, and candidates generally understand he is a man who has to be reckoned with.

JACOB GIESY DEAD.

Passed Quietly Away Monday Afternoon.

After being ill only a few days Jacob Giesy, or "Uncle Jake," as he was popularly called, died at his hotel Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, surrounded by his nearest relatives and friends.

Mr. Giesy was born in Allegheny county, Pennsylvania, the 20th of March 1827. In 1845 his parents moved to Bethel, Mo., and joined Dr. Kiel's colony. He showed considerable business ability, and took an active part in the management of affairs. In 1855 he came to Oregon via the Panama route, and lived awhile in Portland, locating at Aurora in 1856, but in 1860 he made a trip back to Missouri. About this time the Civil War broke out and he enlisted and served in the Home Guard. He married Miss Carolina Fry, and had one daughter Sarah, at present wife of Mr. Emanuel Kell, of this city. After the death of his wife Jacob Giesy again returned to Oregon and established the Aurora hotel restaurant at this place. He made it a success from the start, and Aurora enjoyed the reputation of having the best hotel and restaurant in Oregon. After the railroad was built the trains used to stop here for meals.

Jacob Giesy was probably more widely known than any other man in Aurora. He was a man of strong characteristics, and quite original. Running a hotel had become part of his life, and he would not retire, although he had many chances to sell at good prices. When he didn't like a man he told him so in his presence, and that ended it. The Dayton Herald of last Friday says: "The bank at this place was opened for business today. SPECIAL SCHOOL ELECTION ORDERED

SALEM BOARD OF EDUCATION
WILL PUT MATTER TO VOTE
OF THE PEOPLE

Whether There Shall Be Any Grades
Above the Ninth Taught in the
Salem Schools

The Salem Board of Education met on Saturday night at the office of Clerk Jos. Baumgartner, in the Ladd & Bush bank parlors, and transacted important business for the people of this school district.

For some time a fight has been made on teaching anything above the ninth grade in the Salem public schools, and the matter was ordered put to a vote of the people, at the election in June.

The question to be submitted to the voters at the June election will be: "SHALL THE GRADES ABOVE THE NINTH GRADE BE ADDED TO THE COURSE IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN THIS CITY?" The voters of this school district will have the opportunity to vote for or against this proposition.

If this proposition carries the Tenth grade will be added to the course of study in the Salem public schools next year. And one grade will be added each year for the next two years. Then Salem will have the complete public school course of study as the law provides. THE BOARD OF EDUCATION IS TO BE COMMENDED FOR THIS STEP OF PROGRESS, AND FOR GIVING THE PEOPLE THE RIGHT TO VOTE ON THE MATTER.

More Debt Paid Off.

The board ordered the last of the popular loan notes taken up and paid off, and that wipes out the last cent of floating debt.

Miss Mille Krause, of Monmouth Normal School, was employed to teach the fourth grade in the Park school, the crowded condition of the schools making that necessary. Miss Krause completes her examinations at the State Normal School this week, and will then come to Salem. Mrs. Traver will teach the classes until her arrival.
