

CHICAGO GETS A JURY

Car-barn Murderers Will Now Be Brought to Trial

Took Twenty-Six Days to Find Chicago People Not Too Big Cowards for Jurymen

Chicago, Feb. 8.—After 26 days spent in securing a jury, at a cost of nearly \$15,000, the trial of the car-barn burners opened this morning. Shortly after the court opened, Marx asked for a consultation with the judge, and the court, with the various lawyers, retired to the chambers, where it is understood that Marx offered to plead guilty, and turn state's evidence in consideration of his life being spared. Assistant State's Attorney declared that he would make no trade with Marx, as he had evidence sufficient to convict all the men

involved. The greatest precautions were taken in the admission of spectators, who included many society women, and each person was searched for weapons. Four bailiffs watched the Vandines, and two each tab on the other prisoners.

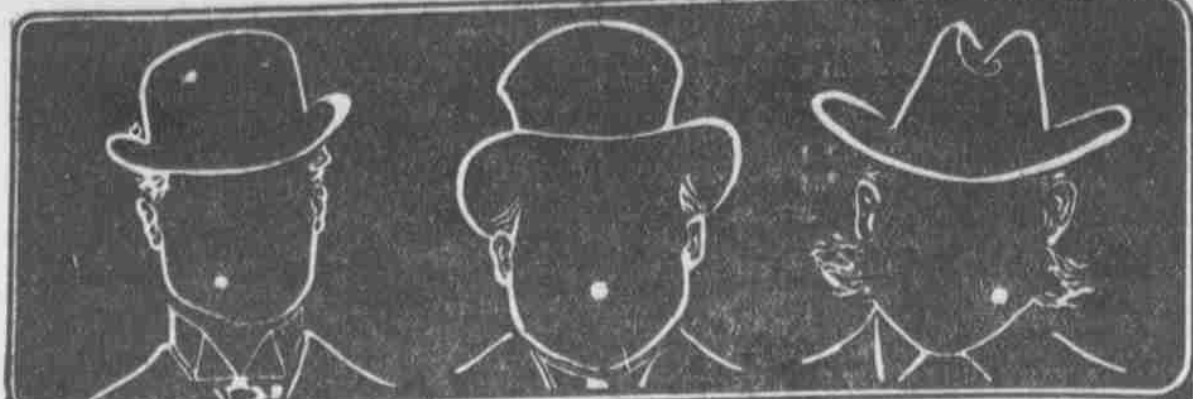
H. St. Helen went to Albany this morning for a few days' stay.
