## CATTLE REPORTED STARVING

### California Stock Suffering While Held in Quarantine.

The Governor is in receipt of a telegraphic request from the Governor of California, stating that large herds of cattle are held in quarantine in Northern California, are starving, and appealing for permission to move these cattle onto the Oregon ranges where they can get subsistence. The California executive asks if, on the certificate of the federal authorities, he will allow these cattle to come into this state.

Late last evening a telegram was received in the Governor's office from Secretary Wilson, of the agricultural department, at Washington, as follows:

"It is reported by the governor of California that the cattle in the quarantined section are starving on account of draught. He desires that permission be granted to ship some of these cattle into your state. This department would inspect and do everything possible to exclude infected animals, but could not guarantee freedom from infection without dipping. It would be necessary for the proper officers of your states to keep such animals under supervision and prevent their leaving your state for 90 days after arrival. Are you willing to receive them? Please wire answer."

These telegrams were forwarded to the governor at Portland, and he will consult with the state veterinarian before giving his answer to the appeal of the California authorities.

## ORDERS MADE BY COURT

### Commissioners Dispose of Road Matters and Take Adjournment

The county court this forenoon disposed of a quantity of routine business.

F. E. Osborne was appointed supervisor for road district No. 4.

O. C. Whitney was appointed road supervisor for district No. 3, vice Dolph Griswold, who declined the appointment recently made.

F. R. DuRette was reappointed supervisor for district No. 6.

In the matter of the petition of J. Ulrich Miller and others for a location of a county road, the court ordered a continuance.

The road petitioned for by Ichabod and Ernest Barrager was dismissed.

A petition from A. Zimmerman and others for the removal of an obstruction in the county road near Mehama was continued.

A Mr. Christenson complained in open court of the location of the road leading from Brooks to Howell Prairie, intersecting the Salem-Silverton road, and the county surveyor was ordered to relocate the lines, and report to the court.

The petition of Walter L. Tooze and others for a county road, was continued, pending the filing of a bond.

The bid of Julius Nelson for furnishing guide boards at 15 cents per name, was accepted.

The court, at noon, adjourned for the term. The remainder of the claims passed upon will be published in tomorrow's Journal.

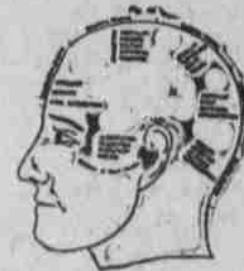
