The prune market is heavy, and none selling but at low prices. There are a great many prunes left in the country, one firm having been offered 30 cars the past week. One and one-half to two cars a day are being shipped by Tillson & Co's Salem packing house. Plenty of prunes can be sold if the price is put low enough. H. S. Gile & Co. report little demand and some shipments.

THE STATE ROADS TO BE BUILT

Work Will Begin Next Week by the Prison Authorities

Supt. C. W. James, of the penitentiary, is now arranging to begin the work of road building, in accordance with the act of the legislature passed at the last regular session. These roads are to be built from the penitentiary to the asylum and the asylum farm, and the reform school. Frank Herren has been appointed as manager and foreman, and he is now arranging to begin the work in a few days, using prisoners for the labor, and all of the convicts so employed will be given two days time for every day spent in work on the roads. A fund of \$3250 is available for the expenses the work, including the hiring of extra guards. The roads to be built will be permanent, and are to be constructed on the most modern methods.

FIRST CHRISTIAN CHURCH

No one can afford to miss hearing Rev. Davis Errett explain the teachings of the Bible at the First Christian church. There were more strangers present last night than at any time this week, and they gave Mr. Errett an undivided attention. The subject of last night's sermon was, as announced, "The Bible." A brief synopsis of the sermon follows: "God is revealed through two sources, the Old Testament and the New. We understand the Bible best when we let Jesus interpret it. The book of God, the whole Book of God, from the beginning to the end, is that which has come from the interpretation of Christ Himself. It is composed of 66 books, and contains the sayings of men, angels, devils, prophets and kings. Some men read the sayings of the devil, and repudiate the entire book because of that. Some read the sayings of the false prophets, and repudiate it because of that. Only one thing can be counterfeited, and that is the pure thing. That is the reason you cannot counterfeit the skeptic, the devil and the other things that are impure and wrong. The Bible is impartial in its record of man. It tells the truth about them. Man is the subject as well as the object of revelation. Had it not been for him, God would not have opened a page of his book." It is impossible to give even the substance of the sermon in a few brief paragraphs. One must hear Mr. Errett and catch the magnetism of his personality to appreciate his remarks and catch the full meaning intended in one of his sermons.

The subject for tonight is "Man and the Bible." Themes for Sunday morning and evening: "Marks of a Genuine Church" and "Is Christianity a Failure?" All are invited to all these services.

offer assistance, if he could in any way be used. After Hanna awoke this morning there was considerable difficulty in keeping his temperature down resorting frequently to sponge baths. At 9:40 he had been given no oxygen for hours. Attendants then said the gravest trouble was that he no longer responded to cold baths. His temperature was only reduced a degree or less, whereas last night baths would lower it three or more. Dover this morning said: "Last night he had one chance in a million. This morning he has one in a hundred." Hanna is conscious, but unable to speak.

Dr. Osler left for Baltimore at 10 o'clock this morning. He will return this afternoon. This is taken as evidence that the physicians think there is no immediate danger of death.
