

WATER RAPIDLY RISING

Willamette River on a Rampage but No Damage Yet

Heavy Rains for Past Thirty-Six Hours Have Melted the Snow in the Mountains

The Willamette river and its tributaries are on a veritable rampage, the result of the heavy rain which has fallen incessantly for the past 36 hours.

Early Sunday morning the clear, cold weather turned warmer and shortly afterward the rain commenced to fall. It continued hard all day Sunday and Sunday night, but today the rain came down in less quantities, nevertheless steadily. Sunday's rain was quite warm, melting the snow in the mountains, bringing the river up with a rush. For awhile today it rose four inches every hour, and at gauge on the wagon bridge at the foot of Ferry street showed the water to be about 15 feet above low water mark at 3 o'clock this afternoon. At that time it was rising quite rapidly.

Turned Colder.

The atmosphere has turned colder since noon which will stop the melting of the snow and the consequent falling of the water in the river after the freshet has reached its height, which will probably be tonight.

No Damage Yet.

The water in the river is still several feet lower than the highest point reached in last year's freshet and no damage has yet been reported.

The lower road between here and Springfield is covered at Judkins' Point, and the stage and other teams are compelled to go over the hill past the Laurel Hill cemetery.

A good many sawlogs are seen floating past Eugene. While they may be some that have lodged on the river bank during low water, it is feared that some of the drives on the upper river and tributaries have broken loose. However, no reports of any losses of logs have reached here this afternoon.

Trains in Southern Oregon and California have been delayed by wash-outs, showing that the hard rain is general all over the Coast. At Sagle, this side of Cottage Grove, the railroad tracks are almost under water and trouble is feared there by the railroad people if the water gets much higher.—Eugene Guard.

It has been suggested that the cattle from Southern California be dipped to kill the fever tick and thus remove all possible danger to Oregon cattle, but the writer has

whole herd of Northern cattle.

We know that many men, even cattlemen, will peep-poo at such a statement. We used to do so, but, like many another man, laughed to our own undoing. We had a ranch where we raised pure-bred Shorthorn cattle. A number of cattle south of the quarantine line had been smuggled over and they were unloaded at Amarillo, Texas, and driven two miles and were watered at a creek in our pasture. Some of the fat, corpulent ticks fell off the cattle and commenced to propagate, and in 45 days time our cattle, which were free from ticks, commenced to die, and die at such an alarming rate that the government sent special inspectors who quarantined not only our pasture, but one-fourth of the county, and a strip of country through which the smuggled

cattle passed 30 miles wide and 200 miles long. Our loss was so great that it practically put us out of the cattle business. Now, there was not a single head of cattle that died that did not have young Southern ticks on them, and on the cattle that escaped none were found. We had another adjoining pasture in which we raised pure-bred Hereford cattle, and, strange to say, of this herd we did not lose a single head except one registered bull, that had broken through the fence to get into the Shorthorn pasture after the Southern cattle had been taken away. He died with Texas or Southern fever. We could give all the scientific explanations and research into Southern or Texas fever, but that would be too long for this issue. Suffice to say, we hope that Governor Chamberlain will stand by

the cattle men of Oregon and not allow a single head of cattle from Southern California to pass the line. We ask our readers' pardon for referring to personal experience, but that experience cost us the profit of 10 years' successful work, and if we can save the cattle men of Oregon from loss by giving our actual knowledge and experience the most bitterly bought experience will not have been acquired in vain.—Roseburg Plaindealer.
