OFFER OF \$50,000 FOR A RAILROAD

Burns People Stand Ready and Willing to Contribute That Sum to Such an Enterprise

While the proposition to extend the Columbia Southern railroad from Manico to Bend, and to establish an automobile freight and passenger line from the latter place to Burns, seems most visionary, it would if it proved practical be a good thing for Burns and also for whatever town comes to connection therewith.

There is probably no place in the United States that is so much in need of transportation facilities as is Burns and the great Harney valley in which it is built. Burns has many natural advantages that should make it a thriving city for it lies at the head of a large fertile valley that has only been partially developed. It is not many miles from the timbered crests of a spur of the Blue mountains, and hills on all sides for many miles form a productive a cattle and sheep range there is in Oregon.

At present the nearest railroad point to Burns is Ontario, which is on the Oregon Short line, 147 miles distant. The intervening country is mountainous and traffic is expensive to the extreme. Agricultural products are of no value when they exceed the demand for home consumption, and thus great areas of rich soil must

time 161,000 acres of valley land open to settlement in addition to large tracts set aside for Indian allotments.

The people of Burns are anxiously looking forward to the introduction of a railroad into the valley, and they state that they have \$50,000 on hand to give as a bonus to a road that will build in there at any time.—Baker City Herald.

The Sportsmen's Show.

New York, Feb. 19.—Judging from indications at today's opening of the tenth annual sportsmen's show will be the most successful of any yet held. Stepping inside Madison Square Garden the visitor finds himself in a realistic reproduction of a wild, mountain country, with sparkling streams gushing out of the hillside and tumbling down the rocks into the spacious lake which covers a large area of the big amphitheatre.

To the allied exhibits of the Canadian guides, both of Quebec and Ontario, and to the Hudson Bay company more than 400 running feet of floor space have been given, and the result is a magnificent display of Canada's resources for the tourist, the hunter, and the fisherman. Montana, Colorado, Idaho, Wyoming, and the Rockies in the west have sent typical exhibits, and one of the interesting competitive features of the show will be contests between the guides of these sections in saddling, off-saddling and packing horses.

The exhibit of trophies of big game hunting and fishing trips is an interesting one, and includes those of some of the most prominent sportsmen in the country. Facing the elevated promenade in the exhibit section, along both sides of the garden, every conceivable article of camp equipment and sportsmen's supply is shown.

No Free Rides to World's Fair.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 19.—The roads which will control the joint validating ticket offices in St. Louis during the world's fair this summer are the Pennsylvania, Big Four, St. Louis & San Francisco, Missouri Pacific, Louisville & Nashville and Chicago & Alton. It is proposed to establish five or six such offices and have a central telephone bureau, which will be connected with the validating headquarters of the St. Louis lines. The officers of the various lines entering St. Louis are inclined to shut down completely on "deadhead" travel during the exposition period. It is pointed out by the railroads that they will have all the passenger traffic they can handle during the fair, and that it is not reasonable to ask for free transportation when the rates will be as low as are anticipated. The question will be definitely settled by a special committee which is to meet here next week.

Senator 100 Years Old.

Frederickton, N. B., Feb. 19.—Senator Wark, the oldest member of the Canadian parliament, celebrated his 100th birthday today, having been born February 19, 1804. Despite his great age the senator is still in the full possession of his mental faculties and enjoys fair bodily health. For several days he has been receiving congratulatory letters and messages from many parts of the Dominion.

HURRAH FOR OLD CHEMAWA

Money for New Buildings and More Pupils

Congressman Hermann is Doing Splendid Work for Salem Indian School

Until the receipt of Congressman Hermann's letter last night, Supt. Potter had felt considerably discouraged over Chemawa's outlook for the next fiscal year. The news from the Indian bureau, as given to the Oregonian correspondent, that Chemawa needs no more new buildings, and was, in their judgment, large enough, made it look as if the Oregon interests were getting a black eye all around.

Therefore, with the Indian office, under the secretary of the interior, adverse to granting any increase in appropriations for the Salem school, it certainly shows that Congressman Hermann has been doing hard, faithful and most effective work, to secure an agreement in the house committee of Indian affairs, of which he is a member, of an increase of \$35,000 over last year's appropriation for improvement.

ments and increased attendance at the Salem Indian school, making a total of over \$135,000 to be expended during the coming fiscal year.

Mr. Hermann succeeded in getting the appropriation for a new brick hospital increased to \$15,000—the attendance increased from 550 to 600 pupils, which is equivalent to an increase of \$8350; additional appropriations for hose and dairy barns, making a total of \$9500, additional employees' quarters, \$5000; and for general repairs, \$6000; all of which will be a great help to this growing institution, as well as Oregon in general.

It was very fortunate for the Salem Indian school that Congressman Hermann was appointed to this important committee of Indian affairs.

When this encouraging news was given out to the pupils and employees the greatest enthusiasm prevailed at Chemawa, and a unanimous vote of thanks was tendered Congressman Hermann for his untiring efforts in behalf of the Salem school.

The people of Salem will appreciate what it is to have a congressman on the committee on Indian affairs, more and more. When the electric line is built to Chemawa, all the region between Salem and the government Indian school will become settled, up, and will be suburban property.
