CARLOAD LIGHTING SUPPLIES

Machinery Arrives After a Long Delay

Salem Light and Power Plant Will Have to Be Practically Rebuilt

Today the first carload of machinery for the rebuilding of the Salem electric plant arrived, and it certainly must be a great source of relief to Manager Springer to finally know that he is going to be able to put his plant into serviceable shape. The car contains on three-phase motor generator set, which is to take place of all the generating machinery in the power house. There are also two series of transformers for the city arc lighting system, and 50 new arc lights for the streets. These latter are of the newest enclosed design, of 1200 candle power, and will run 100 hours without rettriming. One of the most important appliances in the shipment is a marble switchboard 8x20 feet, with all the modern up-to-date instruments for testing lights as to evenness of voltage and equalizing of lights. This shipment includes 108 cases of machinery, 19 pieces, 4 crates, 4 barrels and one tank of oil. The mammoth sub-base castings are immensely heavy and are 8x23 feet. When they are placed into the building they will be set in concrete. The total cost of this machinery is about \$15,000, and when all of it is in place it will virtually replace the entire old plant, except engines, and some new power in that line is also to be installed. In addition to this there is also on the way 50 more of the improved arc street lights and many other articles for the enlargement and betterment of the service.

Mr. Springer says he thinks the Salem company has probably been treated as well by the manufacturers as anyone else, yet it does not seem that eight months is a very long time to wait for goods after the order is taken. It will only take about 10 days to install this new machinery, after which time the lighting and power service will be very much improved. What is also very important to Salem is the fact that the installing of this new machinery will employ a large amount of labor, and cause the expenditure of considerable money in our midst for labor.

ELDER WILSON WINS

Judge Boise Decides the Church of God Case

The Seceders So-Called Are Still in Possession of the Property in North Salem

In the circuit court this morning Judge R. P. Boise decided the case of John M. Needham and others, against A. Wilson and others, by dismissing the suit. The case was brought by the plaintiffs as the trustees of the Church of God, in North Salem, against the defendants who were formerly trustees, but, was alleged to have succeeded and as the property owned by the church was in the name of the defendants as trustees, the plaintiffs asked that they be given the property. Judge Boise, in deciding the case, stated that no evidence had been offered tending to show that the eldership of the Church of God, of the Northwest, which has control of the local churches, a similar body to a conference in other churches, had taken any steps in the matter, and in the absence of such action on the part of the supreme organization of the church, he could only dismiss the complaint, allowing no costs to either party.

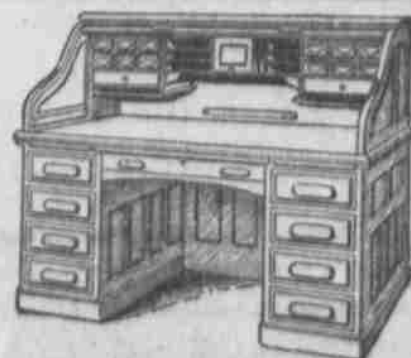
