

PROPOSED COASTWISE RAILROAD

Florence Merchant Advocates Such an Enterprise

Importance of a line of railroad along the coast extending from Portland south, has frequently been mentioned by the Register, and the offer of the matter, recurs to us, the more valuable seems the building of such a line.

The Register has awakened an interest in such an enterprise, and now Wm. Kyle, the Florence merchant, in an interview dwells at length on the necessity for a coastwise road in order to properly develop the dormant resources that would enrich that section. When once a line of railroad sweeps into Willamette valley from over the Cascades via the military road route or out to Stiuslaw, there to be crossed by a coast line that will handle the north and south business in a satisfactory manner, it will not take Lane county long to develop into an empire within itself with Eugene the inland metropolis of the state and Florence a bustling, active tidewater city, equal to the best on the Coast.

These are not the idle fancies of a dreamer, the conjurations of a speculative mind nor the impossible nor improbable outcome in Lane county, if just such a condition should be brought about as we suggest.

Twenty years ago there were plenty of people in Eastern and Middle states who were ready to laugh at the idea of more than one line of railroad vis-

iting this section, but today what is the condition?

Pick up a map of Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Colorado and note the network of railroads that traverse these states in every direction; then convince us if you can that the great Willamette valley, with its illimitable resources, capable of supplying the needs of millions of population, is to be handicapped for years to come by lack of adequate railroad facilities to facilitate its growth and development. Not so. Capital is always seeking safe investment and gigantic enterprises are always looking for additional fields in which to employ their activity and increase their net earnings. This being a fact, transcontinental lines must eventually extend their roadbeds to the Pacific ocean through the fertile Eastern Oregon fields and the far-famed Willamette valley, if they are to keep up with the onward march of events and reap the reward of early entrance into the land of promise.

Oregon mines, Oregon timber, Oregon hops, wheat, oats, fruit and vegetables, Oregon climate, the world's best—these are among the things we offer as evidence that population and traffic will be earnestly knocking at our doors for admission, pledged to aid and abet as in building up a mighty commonwealth in the golden West—Eugene Register.

Regulations for the Lenten Season.

Archbishop Christie of Portland, has issued the following rules for the Oregon diocese for the observation of the Lenten season.

These rules were read in all Catholic churches in the diocese last Sunday morning.

The rules are as follows:

Lent begins February 17th. All the faithful not legitimately dispensed, are obligated in conscience to observe the laws of the church concerning the lenten fast, as follows:

1. The use of flesh meat is allowed at every meal on Sundays, as well as the principal meal on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, Saturdays, of the Ember Days and Holy Week excepted.

2. The use of fish, milk, butter and eggs is permitted on all days of Lent at the evening collation, and the principal meals on those days on which the use of flesh meat is forbidden.

3. In the morning a small piece of bread is allowed with a cup of coffee, tea, chocolate or some similar drink.

4. When the principal meal cannot be taken before noon, the order may be inverted and the collation taken in the morning and the dinner in the evening.

5. Lard or grease may be used in preparing the lawful vitals.

6. Those of the faith who are exempt from the obligation of fasting can, on the days when the use of flesh meat is permitted to all of the faithful, be allowed to use it several times a day, as on the Sundays of Lent, when the obligation is not binding. The use of both flesh meat and fish together to the same meal is strictly forbidden during the whole of Lent.

The following persons are exempt from fasting: All those who have not attained their 21st year or who have passed their 60th year; those whose weak health or condition otherwise may demand the full amount of nourishment, and of all those whose occupations are of a laborious and exhausting nature.

Those who are excused from fasting, on account of age or hard labor, may use flesh meat more than once on the days on which it is allowed.

By an indult of our Holy Father, Pius IX, the soldiers and seamen in the United States service have only six days of abstinence during the year, viz: Ash Wednesday; the last three days of the Holy Week; the Vigil of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary; the Vigil of Christmas. This dispensation does not exempt from the law of fasting.

By another indult of the 15th of March, 1895, the Holy See has given for ten years, to the bishops of the United States the faculty of dispensing, in favor of working people, from the law of abstinence on certain days.

By virtue of this indult and dispensation of Lent, Working people are permitted to use flesh meat once a day on all fast and abstinence days of the year, except Fridays, Ash Wednesday, Wednesday and Saturday in Holy Week, and the Vigil of Christmas.

The above dispensation is granted not only to working men and women but also to their entire families.

It is eminently in accordance with the spirit of the church that all those who use the dispensations from the fast and abstinence, should supply, in part, the spirit of penance, by prayers and almsdeeds; by avoiding all public shows, parties and amusements, and by abstaining from all intoxicating beverages.
