### EDWARD EDES DEAD

Passed Away at Oakland California This Afternoon

Was Born in Salem and Served Three Terms as City Recorder—Funeral Monday

Edward N. Edes, formerly well-known in this city, and prominent in affairs here, died in Oakland, Cal., at 1 o'clock this afternoon, and the remains will be shipped from that city to Salem tonight, and, if no delays occur, will arrive here Monday at 5:40 a. m. The remains will be taken to the home of Mrs. Herman W. Barr, and at 10:30 a. m., on Monday, the funeral will be held from the Catholic church, and interment will be had in the Catholic cemetery, south of this city.

Ed. N. Edes was a native son of Salem, and here the greatest part of his life was spent. He received a good business education, and when he grew to manhood served for a time as an officer on the Salem police force. Later he engaged in the cigar business, and in 1892 he was elected city recorder of Salem and was twice re-elected, serving in that capacity with ability for six years. After retiring from that office he went to Seattle, and for a time worked in the tax collector's office in that city, and later as an officer with one of the large detective agencies.

Leaving Seattle he went to Oakland, California, where he had a good position with a large warehouse company, until sickness overtook him that soon carried him away.

Deceased was prominent in social and fraternal circles in this city for many years. At one time he was a member of Olive lodge, No. 18, I. O. O. F., and in 1895 represented that lodge in the grand lodge of Oregon, at the session held in Roseburg. He also joined Williamette Encampment No. 2, and was a charter member of Salem lodge No. 336, B. P. O. Elks, and for years its secretary. He was also a member of Protection lodge, No. 2, A. O. U. W., and to the day of his death held a benefit certificate for \$5000 in that order.

He leaves a wife and one son, about 12 years old, and one sister, Mrs. H. W. Meyers, who is now in San Francisco on a visit.

Ed. N. Edes was a man of generous impulses and counted the leading people of this city among his friends while in office here. He was an efficient officer, and made a good record while recorder of this city.
