PROHIBITION'S NAME A TICKET

Candidates for All County Officers Nominated

Oliver Stewart of Chicago, Addressed the Gathering and Again Lectured Last Night

The Prohibition county convention finished its labors last evening and adjourned. A complete county ticket was named, and the usual prohibition platform was adopted, after which Oliver Stewart, of Chicago, addressed the convention on the subject of prohibition in politics, and told how he was elected to the Illinois legislature from a Republican district in Chicago last fall, the first prohibitionist to secure such a place in Illinois. The convention was followed by the serving of refreshments in the W. C. T. U. hall by the ladies of that body, and all the members of the convention were regaled with a substantial meal.

During the evening a mass meeting was held at the First M. E. church, where Mr. Stewart lectured on prohibition, and the necessity of continuing the warfare on the liquor business. The platform adopted by the convention is the usual declaration of principles, and is, word for word, the one adopted two years ago. In addition, however, the following resolutions were adopted by the convention: "Resolved, That we favor the total annihilation of the American saloon by national and state prohibition, and we hereby pledge our allegiance to the national and state Prohibition party. Your committee would further recommend the movement in our state to abolish the saloon by constitutional amendment, and heartily endorse every legitimate means that tends to bring about such results, especially the local option measures now before the people."

Circuit Court Business.

Four suits were filed in the circuit court yesterday afternoon, at least one of which is of a great deal of importance. It is the suit of J. Wolfard and 17 others, all residents and business people of Silverton, against the executor of the estate of the late H. F. Fisher, owner of the Silverton flouring mills, asking that the railroad switch from the Southern Pacific station in that town to the mills, running through water street to be declared a public nuisance, and that it be torn up. The plaintiffs assert that the track is not a public railroad, but uses the public street for private purposes, that it is a nuisance and a damage to plaintiffs. They ask for an injunction prohibiting the defendants from using the track, and an order to the sheriff to remove the track from the street in question; and that perpetual injunction be issued against the use of the street for the purposes indicated.

Clara Huddleston brought suit for divorce against Joseph Huddleston. The couple was married in Butte, Montana, in November, 1887, and there are three children, aged 11, 9 and 3 years, respectively, and the wife asks for an absolute divorce on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment, and for the custody of the youngest child, now with her. 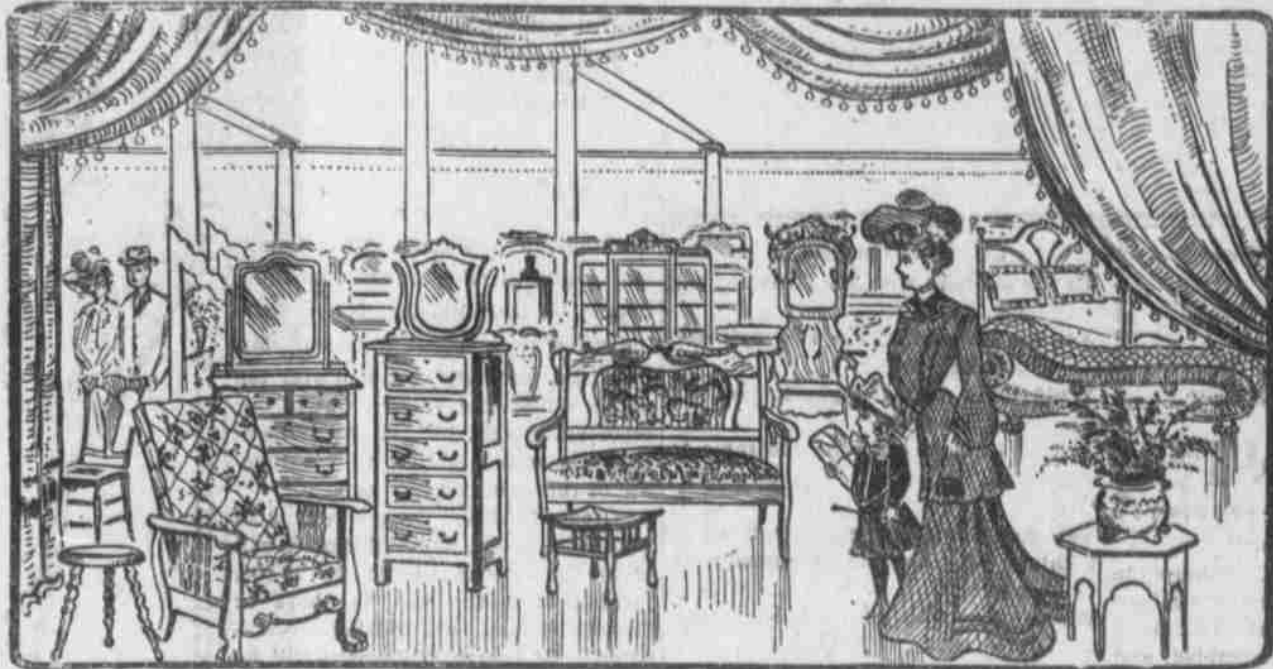

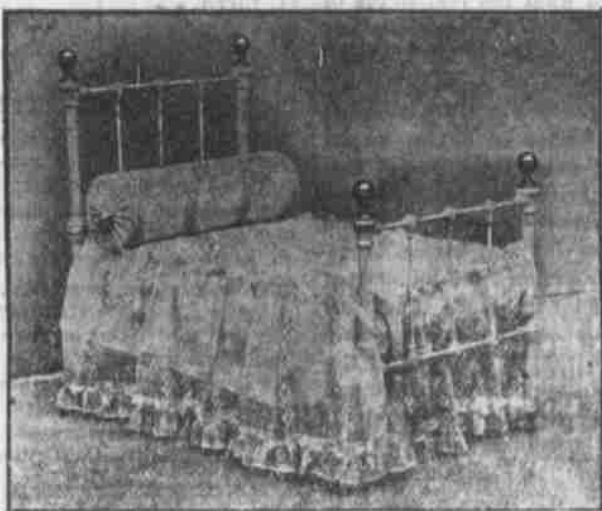
